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Johnson's Attorneys Attack One Section of the Mann Law

CHICAGO, May 9.—Counsel for Jack Johnson, the negro prize fighter, halted the hearing of testimony in the white and the jury was excused till afternoon, while Federal Judge Carpenter listened to arguments on the objection.

Belle Schreiber had resumed the stand and brought her testimony up to October 15, 1910, the date named in the indictment against Johnson, when Johnson's counsel objected to the introduction of any evidence bearing on the counts in the indictment.

Johnson is charged with bringing the Schreiber woman from Pittsburgh to Chicago for "immoral purposes." The attorney contended that the Mann white slave act is directed against the transportation of women from one state to another for commerce in their immorality and not against immorality itself. He contended that the phase of the law covering immorality is unconstitutional and alleged that the indictment was faulty in failing to show that the acts complained of were committed within the jurisdiction of the court.

TENNIS TEAM OF CREIGHTON HIGH TO PLAY THE BLUFFS

TARIFF BILL PASSES HOUSE

Two Republicans and Four Progressives Go Over to "Enemy."

FIGHT SHIFTS TO UPPER BODY

Little Prospect of Final Action Before August First—Smart to Offer Amendments to Every Schedule.

WASHINGTON, May 9.—The Underwood tariff bill, proclaimed by the democratic party as the answer to its platform pledge to revise the tariff downward, was passed by the house late yesterday.

When Speaker Clark announced the vote in loud tones that revealed his satisfaction, exuberant democrats hoisted a stuffed donkey over the heads of their colleagues in the rear of the chamber.

With the bill on its way to the senate, there was a rush of representatives for their homes tonight. In the house adjournment will be taken at a time beginning next week, until June 1.

Republicans and progressives, led respectively by Representatives Mann and Murdock, protested to the last against the measure, the lowest tariff bill ever written.

Republicans who voted for the bill were Cary and Stafford of Wisconsin. Democrats who opposed it were Broussard, Dupre, Lazaro and Morgan of Louisiana and C. B. Smith of New York.

and Ruple of Pennsylvania, Nolan of California and Bryan of Washington. Kent of California, formerly a republican, but now an independent progressive, also voted for the bill.

Senator Smoot will offer amendments to every schedule in the bill. These will be debated at length and a record vote probably will be required on each.

The bill will be laid before the senate tomorrow and will be referred to the finance committee.

Chairman Simmons had been hoping to be able to report it tomorrow, but he now thinks it cannot be reported under three weeks, even if hearings are not held.

Opinion in the finance committee is that at least five weeks will be spent by the senate in consideration of the bill after it is reported.

NEBRASKA DELEGATION SPLITS Democrats and Republicans Divide in Tariff Vote.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) WASHINGTON, May 9.—(Special Telegram)—Out of a total vote of 435, with one death intervening, 430 votes were polled today in the passage of the Underwood tariff bill, the vote standing 231 ayes to 104 noes.

In that vote the Nebraska delegation split squarely, the democrats voting for the measure and the republicans against. Iowa came along with the same condition, with South Dakota and Wyoming voting solidly against the measure.

It is a good deal to say in commendation of the republican states mentioned that they were all present and voting on the final passage of the Underwood bill.

A consensus of opinion is that the bill is neither protection nor free-trade, that it is neither tariff for revenue or for competition, but a combination of them all, adroitly arranged for the purpose of bringing to the democracy the support of the cities, and by that is meant the big cities, against the small cities and the country.

President is Well Pleased Hopes Now for Final Action on Currency Reform.

WASHINGTON, May 9.—President Wilson was so encouraged by the passage today of the tariff bill in the house that he hopes now for final action on currency reform at the present session of congress.

The president studied a preliminary draft of a currency bill brought him by Representative Glass, probable chairman of the house banking and currency committee, and told his callers that in the interval between now and June 1 he expected to confer with as many currency authorities as possible.

Majority Leader Underwood announced that currency legislation will be taken up in the house about June 1.
