

O'CONNOR WINS HIS SUIT

St. Louis American Club Must Pay Him Five Thousand Dollars.

JURORS OUT A HALF HOUR

Former Manager of Browns Ordered Dismissed on Charge of Favoring Lajoie Against Ty Cobb. in Game.

ST. LOUIS, May 13.-The St. Louis American league base ball club must pay
Jack O'Connor \$5.000, the amount he
would have received in salary had he not
been discharged as manager prior to the
opening of the 1911 season, a jury in the
circuit court decided tonight. The trial,
which had occupied the court ail day,
came to a close with unexpected suddenness. The jurors were out only thirty
minutes.

O'Connor claimed he had been engaged to manage the St. Louis team for both the 1910 and 1911 seasons, but that he was dismissed at the end of 1910. A deposition was filed in the case today by President Ban Johnson, stating that he had ordered O'Connor dismissed on the ground that he had instructed Third Baseman John Corriden to play far behind third base when Napoleon Lajois was at bat in the final double-header with Cleveland of the season of 1910.

Rivalry Intense. At that time there was great rivalry between Lajole and Ty Cobb of Detroit for premier batting honors and an automobile had been offered as a prize to the winner. Lajole secured eight hits in San Francisco eight times at bat in the double-header and came within a fraction of tying Cobb's record.

Sidney Cook, who witnessed the game from the grandstand, testified that he had heard O'Connor instruct his team to fayor their Cleveland opponents. He said he heard O'Connor tell Pitcher Malloy to give bases on balls to certain Cleveland batters and in one instance heard him instruct Malloy to hit Manager McGuire with the ball. These instructions, the witness said, had the effect of bringing Lajole to bat every other inning. Cook also testified he heard O'Connor swear at Third Baseman Corriden for fielding one of Lajoie's bunts.

D. Cronheim testified he heard the instructions to the players, but said he was not sure as to the identity of the voices he heard.

O'Connor denied that he had favored Lajole or that he had criticised Corriden for fielding as many of the Frenchman's hits as he did. He denied that he had given the instructions concerning which Cook and Cronheim testified. Told to Play Back.
