

FAKE "DOCTORS" CAPTURED Promoters of Electro-Oxygen Company in Federal Meshes.

THEY HAD OPERATED IN OMAHA One Caught in Memphis, Where He Will Fight Case, and Two Are Arrested at Colorado Springs Monday.

"Doctor" E. T. Wittman and wife and "Doctor" E. D. Brantley, alleged cure-all fakery, who worked their game in Omaha for two weeks the latter part of April and the first part of this month, were arrested by federal authorities and will be brought to Omaha to answer a charge of using the mails to defraud.

The Electro-Oxygen company was the name of the concern while it worked in Omaha, and many were the big fees they picked up for little or no work. They advertised extensively in the Omaha newspapers and came to Omaha well recommended.

For almost two weeks the "doctors" worked their game in Omaha, collecting an enormous amount of money. Then knowing that it was high time to be "moving" the entire company, including their building in a little box, closed their offices and left, leaving no address.

To Prosecute the Police Organization Formed to Curb the Actions of Officers.

Chief Dunn Says He Will Drop the Charges Against Officer Smith, Held for Beating a Man Named Pearson.

An organization effected to prosecute charges against Omaha policemen will not desert with the trial of Detective Lahey and Sullivan, according to statements made by Harry Zimman, attorney for the three, who alleged they were mistreated when arrested on a charge of soliciting money under false pretense, a charge which could not be substantiated.
