SAVE CITY, SAYS ANDERSON

Chicago Mission Worker Gives Address to Baptists.

STRATEGIC POINTS FOR LABOR

Co-operation Urged to End that Forces of Evil May Be Coped with in Their Greatest Strongholds.

"If you save the cities of America, you save America. If you save America, you save the world. A lost America will never save China." Rev. Frank L. Anderson, superintendent of City Missions of Chicago, gave this as his view at the banquet by the Baptist Social Union of Greater Omaha at the Paxton hotel last evening.

According to Rev. Mr. Anderson, "the forces of evil recognize that the great cities of the country offer opportunity, and there they are making their last stand against Christianity. The cities are the strategic points, and if the church loses its foothold in the city, then our God is simply a country God."

Three great changes, according to Rev. Mr. Anderson have come over the country. We have changed from an agricultural to a manufacturing people; from a rural to an urban people; and foreign people are dominating our country.

He declared that the foreign element is dominating the cities and in turn the nation. In Omaha, he said, 21.8 per cent of the population was declared foreign born.

The speaker declared that Christians must center their forces in the city. He stated that at present 31.9 per cent of the church membership is located in the cities. Of this number is numbered 88.7 per cent of the Jewish church membership, 52.2 per cent of the Catholic church, and only 12.1 per cent of the Baptist church membership.

The address by Rev. Mr. Anderson followed an interesting program given under the auspices of the Baptist Social Union of Greater Omaha, an organization made up of the Baptist churches of Omaha, Benson, South Omaha, Florence and Council Bluffs.

C. W. Noble of the Calvary Baptist church acted as toastmaster, and a number of musical numbers were furnished. During the course of the evening four new Baptist preachers of Omaha were introduced, and made brief talks. They were Rev. W. R. Hill from Independence, Ia., who recently came to the South Omaha Baptist church; Rev. E. B. Taft, new pastor at the Grace Baptist church; Rev. Oscar A. Ault, new pastor at the German Baptist church, and Rev. C. H. Burrill, who comes from the Rochester Theological seminary of New York to the Benson Baptist church.
