#### AMERICAN CITIZENSHIP.

#### Foreign-born Population Must be Taught to Respect Its Worth.

Civilized nations are but families in extensio. The government of a family has an instinctive dread of the members becoming physically or morally diseased and guards with vigilance against the intrusion of anything questionable. Hence to become united in marriage with a member of a family makes the individual part and parcel thereof. No one questions the right of the parents to exercise this proper esplonage over those they have in charge and the father would be looked upon as vile beyond expression who could be found willing to see his pure, beautiful daughter wedded to a drunken roue, or his son bring home as a wife a woman of the town.

Society must protect itself. Freemasonry has its strong barriers against the intrusion of worthless material, and its proud boast is, that none can pass its portals save when preceded by the tongue of good report. 
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
