

RUM AND ROMANISM.

Rome is Between Fires, and Jump Which Way She May, is Sure to Get Badly Scorch'd.

The venerable doctor of divinity who said, some years ago, that Rum and Romanism were the foremost issues in American politics, called attention to a fact that cannot be ignored and must not be neglected.
