"With Sullivan I have already dealt, and here I need only state that, having established himself in Chicago, he had taken to the study of law, in which branch of the profession he was nowin 1876-preparing to practice. He had been maintaining his questionable reputation, for he had shot a man in cold blood; and though twice tried, had been successful in escaping the consequences of his act, owing to the employment of that process so frequently charged against the government in Ireland-packing the jury.

"Contrary to expectation and the requirements of the existing constitution, no Clan-na Gael convention took place in this year-1883. In the ordinary course of events such an assembly should have met in August, 1883.
