

A Valuable Book on St. Patrick.

Westward-bound the other day, whilst riding through the hills of Massachusetts, which were snow-bound, and fringed with the oak brush, I read the "Story of St. Patrick," by that scholarly writer, Dr. Sanderson, and "Ireland and the Irish," by Dr. Findlay.

These two able writers have rendered a real service to Protestantism, and the cause of historical accuracy. There has been much misunderstanding of the ancient Irish church, and much misrepresentation of that Irish apostle Patrick. Dr. Sanderson describes the early settlers, and original language and religion of Ireland, in an interesting way. He is in full agreement with the leading authorities, when he enlarges upon the learned and highly christian character of the early Irish. Science, philosophy, and letters reached a degree of perfection in Ireland, not equalled by any other nation of western Europe.

The "Story of Patrick" is an extraordinary one. He lived in the early part of the Fifth century. When he was 15 years old, he, with some 200 others, was taken by some piratical seamen, off to Ireland. His birthplace was near the Clyde, in Scotland. He was sold to an Irish king near the present town of Ballymena. He spent some six years in herding cattle, when by prayer and faith he began to lay hold of the Saviour, and experienced a wonderful spirit awakening. He escaped from slavery, returned home, and prepared himself to become a missionary to the Irish. His father and grandfather were spiritual leaders, or priests, and both were married. In fact, in the early British church, the clergy habitually married. The evidence is satisfactory that British christianity sprang from Asia Minor, and not from Rome, and for several hundred years was not subject to the authority of the papacy.

Patrick, who is living in our day, would be regarded as a Protestant preacher of the evangelical type and with evangelical methods. He was wholly out of line with the doctrine, spirit and forms of the Roman church, which has so strangely appropriated him as its great Irish saint. His teaching was emphatically scriptural and evangelical; he taught that communists should have both bread and wine in the Lord's supper; that conversion was the work of divine grace in the heart, while no reference is found to image or saint worship. In the Irish church of his day, the popes had no place. In fact there is no allusion to them. This is shown by the fact that the popes make no statement whatever of the religious affairs in Ireland. In the church at Rome it appears that nothing was known of the revival of Patrick.

In his own writings, and they are very valuable for their bearing upon his own religious feelings and state of heart, there is no reference to any authority of bishop or pope over him, in his call to the work. It came from God. The early Irish monastery, established and fostered by Patrick, was not so much a monastery, as it was a college, to prepare missionaries for the work of the Gospel. It was a great educational and spiritual center. The monastery became famous for the service rendered to God. The Irish scholars went out from these christian schools, and overran Europe, doing faithful and heroic work for both religion and education. These were the days prior to the papacy in Ireland. The Roman church is not the cause of that ancient Irish religion and learning, but she is the cause for the decline of both.

It is to be hoped such a book will find its way into tens of thousands of homes. It is quite time that Irish history should be cleared of the fog cast about it by the papal church. Such early Gospel teachers as Patrick of Ireland, Columbo of Scotland, Bede of Britain, and Wals of Spain belong to the Protestant faith, and not the Roman Catholic. They should be reclaimed.

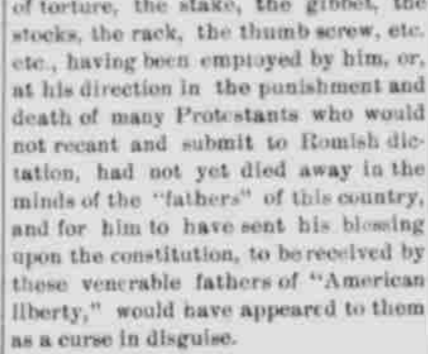
The second part of this great book, by Dr. Findlay, is chiefly valuable for its exact reproduction of an immense amount of historical data bearing upon the Irish of the early christian centuries. Findlay is a ripe scholar, and a pains taking and faithful chronicler. I know of no book attainable so cyclopedic on early Irish christianity. Every Protestant minister in the land, with this one book will have the whole matter cleared up about the Romish perversion of the Irish church.
