"Austin E. Ford, who was a Republican candidate for congress last fall in the Seventh district. Is a resident of the Thirtieth assembly district, though his life has been spent in the down-town district. He is a nephew of Patrick Ford, editor of the Irish World and the Freeman's Journal, and is a journalist employed on those periodicals. He was born in Boston in 1857. His father was the first volunteer to answer the call of Lincoln in 1861. The family had been identified with the abolition cause. He was educated in the public schools of New York and a Catholic college in San Francisco and for twenty-one years he has been managing editor of the Irish World. He took a prominent part in the Blaine campaign of 1894, and had the name of 'Blaine Irishman' fastened on him. He ran for congress in the Seventh district in 1892, and polled a good vote, and a large one last year." By way of throwing in a little light
