

CRIMINAL NEGLIGENCE.

Marshal Kessler and the Gang's Crew Allow a Boy to Die in Jail.

The Journal contains the following report: "William McMannany, 11 years old, serving a ten-month sentence in the county jail for petty larceny, died in his cell at 3 o'clock yesterday morning, after an illness of two days. He was being cared for by the female prisoners on the fourth tier of the jail prior to his death. Saturday Dr. Burchard, the city physician, directed that he be removed to the city hospital, as he seemed to be suffering severely from pneumonia, but for some reason he was allowed to remain in the jail. When he died the women prisoners set up a moaning that attracted the attention of the night jailer, and he notified the coroner, who directed that the body be taken to the undertaking parlors of Leo J. Stewart. Yesterday Deputy Coroner Wheeler examined into the cause of McMannany's death and arrived at the conclusion that he died of pneumonia. On August 5 William McMannany, Sanford McMannany and "Bud" Palmer, all boys, were sentenced to ten months in the county jail in Justice Walls' court for stealing a Bible from a residence in the eastern part of the city. They were known to the officers of the law as incorrigible boys, and have given them much trouble. The coroner will not hold an inquest."
