Omaha's public schools close to-day for the summer vacation. Secretary Ober of the Y. M. C. A. was tendered a farewell reception on Thursday night.

To-morrow is Decoration day, when most of the business houses will be closed at least one-half day.

The bond of Ex-Treasurer Bolln was presented to the clerk of the supreme court, Thursday, by his attorneys.

The Seventh Ward Military Band will give its first concert of the season in Hanscom Park, Sunday, May 30.

The Seventh Ward Military Band has been selected to furnish the music at the fair grounds and in the parades during the June races.

Joel W. West, one of the attorneys in the Bolln case, has been arrested, charged with attempting to bribe the jury in the first trial of the case.

Henry Hornberger was fined \$10 for violating the State Pharmacy law by selling and compounding drugs without being a registered pharmacist.

Bishop Newman will shortly move to San Francisco, having been chosen for that place at the last general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church.

The sale of the water works plant was confirmed by Judge Shiras in the United States circuit court Thursday, and the purchasers were given fifteen days in which to make good their bid.

The directors of the Los Angeles, Cal., chamber of commerce have passed resolutions requesting the legislature to appropriate \$75,000 for California's exhibit at the Trans-Mississippi Exhibition.

BI-ANNUAL MEETING

Of the Loyal Orange Institution, United States of America.

To all officers, members and delegates to the 26th session of the Supreme Grand Lodge of the Loyal Orange Institution, U. S. A.

Special arrangements are being made with the Trunk Line and other passenger associations for reduction of railroad fare to and from Philadelphia, for the Supreme Grand Lodge Session, June 9th, 10th and 11th, which will be full fare going to Philadelphia, and one-third fare returning, and to entitle all to this reduction the following instructions will have to be strictly complied with:

1. When applying at your railroad ticket office tell ticket agent that you are going to attend the meeting of the Supreme Grand Lodge of the Loyal Orange Institution and ask for certificate. If, however, the ticket agent at a local station is not supplied with certificates and through tickets to Philadelphia, he will inform you of the nearest important station where certificates can be obtained. In such a case the delegate should purchase a local ticket to such station and there get his certificate and ticket to Philadelphia.

2. No reduction will be made going to Philadelphia.

3. The certificates will be collected at meeting of Supreme Grand Lodge for the necessary endorsement and use of special agent and will be afterward returned and will entitle holder to pay one-third fare returning on presentation of said certificate at railroad ticket office.

4. Certificates are not transferable, neither are return tickets transferable.

5. The return tickets will in all cases be closely limited to continuous passage.

6. No reduction will be made to any person who fails to obtain a certificate and which is not properly endorsed at grand lodge meeting.

7. Delegates and others availing of the reduction in fare should present themselves at the ticket offices for certificates and tickets at least thirty minutes before departure of trains.

With the foregoing inducements, all lodges should avail themselves of the reduction to send delegates.

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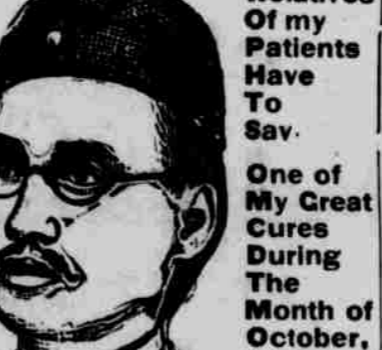
