Popery an Intolerant System.

Man is not responsible to his fellow man for his religious opinions or practices; but all are responsible to God; and "vengeance" is his alone. In direct opposition to these statements stands the intolerance of popery. The Roman Catholic is bound to believe that all who hold the doctrines advanced by the council of Trent, and summarily composed in Pope Pius' creed, are out of the reach of salvation, and must certainly be damned to eternity. Out of this church, it is positively asserted, there is no salvation. Members of the Greek communion, Protestants of every class, and denomination, our Leightons, and Hobers, and Martyns, our Owens, and Baxters, and Howes, our Miltons and Lockes, our Whitefields and Wesleys, our Bunyans and Howards—are all included in the same condemning sentence. No matter what were their excellencies, their piety might be seraphic, their benevolence godlike, their path like the "shining light" that illuminates and gladdens all nature; they have committed the unpardonable sin of refusing to pay homage to the man of the triple crown, and therefore the Roman Catholic is bound to believe that they are lost forever. The first lisplings of the infant, the conclusions of the learned, the declarations of the noble, the priests' instructions, the pontiff's decrees, re-echo the sound, "Out of the Roman Catholic church there is no salvation!" Nor is this all. The intolerance exists in practice as well as in theory. It is an undoubted maxim of that persecuting church that those whom she shall choose to call heretics may and ought to be compelled by the secular power to renounce their opinions, or be punished for their contumacy, even unto death. Such is the decree of the fourth council of Lateran, practically illustrated in the crusades against the Albigenses and the horrible persecutions endured by the reformers in the sixteenth century. And such is the present doctrine of the Romish church, although the power to enforce it is in good measure wanting.

Protestantism in Italy.

We have had this year the great manoeuvres quite close by Pinerolo at the door of our valleys. King Humbert, after having received a deputation of our General Synod, all at once ordered his carriage for Torre Pellice. His visit was unexpected, but in half an hour the people made a real miracle, changing the little town into a beautiful garden, with banners and flowers. The king was met by twenty of our pastors (Waldensian) and by four Roman Catholic priests. He stopped a few minutes only at the Roman convento, and went directly to the Waldensian House, erected in 1889, in remembrance of the coming back from the exile, and there was cheered and received by a beautiful choir, listened to with great attention and pleasure. Moving from that spot he directed his path towards our church, which has been admired for its simplicity, and afterwards he walked up to the hospital, where the deaconesses and the members of the direction had the privilege to show everything to his majesty, who was much pleased. He said, after shaking hands with every one: "I did love the Waldenses, but now I would love them more if it were possible." Our king spoke loudly in Pinerolo in high terms of his visit to the Waldenses, and we rejoice in that great honor because, loyal to God, we want to be loyal to our king and our country.
