

SANTIAGO BOMBARDED.

A MADRID DISPATCH THAT IS NOT DENIED.

IS GUARDEDLY CONFIRMED.

A Large Number of American Vessels Were There and One of Their Special Missions Was to Cut the Cable—The Spanish Fleet Still Dodging Sampson—Wasting Much Cost.

MADRID, May 20.—A Havana dispatch says Santiago de Cuba was bombarded, but little damage was done.

CHICAGO, May 19.—A dispatch to the Chicago News from Washington says: Although no official is given out at the navy department, the opinion is cautiously expressed that the reported bombardment of Santiago de Cuba is probably true.

A large number of American vessels are there and one of the special missions to which they have been assigned is the cutting of the cable from that port.

The outlook for a naval battle within twenty-four hours is considered promising.

NEW YORK, May 19.—A dispatch to the New York Times from Washington says: Admiral Sampson is now, it is said, in a position to be regularly and frequently informed of the approach of the enemy, and the Spanish admiral is now or will be cut off and unable to turn in any direction with safety.

"We are bound to come up with him," said a prominent naval officer, "unless he decides to run for our coast. But that will only defer the inevitable meeting for a few days. The longer he runs and dodges, the shorter becomes his supply of fuel. Once that is exhausted, he has no place to which he can resort for supplies except San Juan or Havana.

POLO IN CANADA.

Premier Laurier states the Canadian Government's Position.

OTTAWA, May 20.—Mr. Charlton, a member from Ontario, called the government's attention to the presence in Canada of Senor Polo y Bernabe, late Spanish minister at Washington, who seemed to be actively engaged in attending to an office of war. A few days ago Senor Downing was arrested as spy in Washington and committed suicide, and it is feared that the presence of Spanish officials here might lead to complications as being considered a breach of neutrality.

Premier Laurier replied that the government had no knowledge that Bernabe had done anything to warrant interference by the government; at any rate, the attention of the government had not been called to the matter. The British empire had always been the asylum for refugees under any circumstances. So long as the Spanish ambassador did not abuse Canada's hospitality the government did not conceive that it was in any bound to take notice of his presence here.

ILLINOIS TORNADO.

Eleven Killed and Forty Injured in Oglet County by the Wind.

ROCKFORD, Ill., May 20.—Eleven people are known to be dead and forty badly injured as the result of a tornado which swept over Oglet county last night. The storm came from the southwest and was from 300 to 400 feet wide. It leveled everything in its path, demolishing hundreds of farm houses and barns and killing much live stock.

The storm was severest at Stillman Valley, where it wrecked fifteen buildings, two churches and a depot. Great damage was also done at Adeline, many buildings being razed. The railroads report many washouts. Telegraph and telephone wires were badly affected.

Our Growing Japanese Trade.

WASHINGTON, May 20.—The commerce of the United States with Japan has grown more in the last year than that of any other nation. The annual returns of the foreign trade of the empire of Japan just received by the bureau of statistics shows that the imports into Japan from the United States increased from \$8,186,750 in 1896 to \$13,513,318 in 1897, while her exports to the United States increased from \$15,766,170 in 1896 to \$26,215,202 in 1897.

Inspector Schaeck Dead.

CHICAGO, May 20.—Inspector Michael John Schaeck, who was the best known member of the Chicago police force, with which he had been connected thirty years, died last night of diabetes and inflammatory rheumatism. His estate is valued at \$350,000.

A British Soldier Shot by a Spaniard.

GIBRALTAR, May 20.—A number of British soldiers while out boating yesterday, attempted to land on Spanish territory, whereupon a sentry fired upon them and wounded one man.

BEFORE DEWEY'S TIME.

The Philippine Islands Had Seen Some Stormy Days.

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 20.—It appears from information brought by the steamship Empress of India that the Spanish did a little bombarding on their own account in the Philippines about a fortnight before Admiral Dewey silenced their fleet. About the middle of April, says a Manila report, Spanish warships went down to Cebu, where they bombarded the city. The troops met no opposition on landing, the rebels having fled before a shot was fired, taking with them, it is said, \$200,000 in cash. About thirty natives were killed in the bombardment, but no European casualties are reported. The fore guns in business in Cebu, hoisted their national flags over their premises and these were respected by the Spanish admiral, Caba, which ranks third in the cities of the Philippines, was wrecked by the bombardment.

A massacre of rebels by the Spanish also preceded Admiral Dewey's victory.

An account from Manila says: "The other day a panic was occasioned in the city by the report that the suburb of Tondo had risen. All the doors and windows were closed and the civil guard paraded the streets. The real cause of the panic was afterwards discovered to be a surprise by the civil guard of a meeting of insurrectionists in a house in Calle de Camda. The civil guard opened fire upon the rebels and at the same time burst open the doors of the house. The rebels offered stout resistance with the long knives and axes, but the volleys soon settled matters, eleven natives being killed. Eight of the guard were wounded and later two died. Subsequently sixty or seventy persons were captured and shot without loss of time. It is estimated 200 rebels escaped into the country. Two companies of the Third native regiment were also sent in pursuit. Risings in Bolinao, Zamboanga, have been subdued, Spanish troops having killed thousands of Indians and hundreds of women and children."

MISSOURI TROOPS MOVE.

Second Regiment of Volunteers Off for Chickamauga.

CAMP STEPHENS, Jefferson Barracks, Mo., May 20.—The Second regiment, Missouri volunteers, broke camp yesterday afternoon and marched across the reservation here to the depot, where they took three specials that will convey the first Missouri infantry soldiers to the point of mobilization at Chickamauga. Two weeks of camp life with no equipment furnished by the government has made the boys hardy but not a little ragged. Each company had three days' rations, hardtack and corned beef, issued to them, besides ten days' field rations. The first regiment will leave to-day, while the Third still has no orders.

CONGRESS AWAITS NEWS.

No Adjournment Will Be Considered Until After the Naval Battle.

WASHINGTON, May 20.—The opinion of the leaders in Congress is that until they know the result of the naval battle, which is to take place whenever Sampson and Schley catch the Spanish fleet, final adjournment will not be considered.

TO FALLS CHURCH, VA.

Transportation for the Twenty-Second Kansas Has Been Forwarded.

TOPEKA, Kan., May 20.—Colonel Lindsay of the Twenty-second Kansas has been notified from Washington that transportation to take his command to Falls Church, Va., has been forwarded to him.

CHARLESTON DELAYED.

A Trivial Accident Causes the Steamer to Put Back to Mare Island.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 20.—On account of a trivial accident to her condensers, the Charleston put back to Mare Island to-day for repairs. She will not get to sea for two days.

Barred From Missouri.

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., May 20.—State Superintendent of Insurance Oread to-day refused to license the Woodmen of the World of Omaha, Neb., to do a fraternal and beneficiary insurance business in Missouri for 1898. The refusal was made on the ground that the constitution and by-laws of the company do not give it a representative form of government as required by section 1 of the fraternal insurance law.

Tornado at Peabody, Kan.

WICHITA, Kan., May 20.—At 6:30 last night a storm approaching a tornado in violence struck the west side of Peabody and destroyed many small residences and outbuildings. No loss of life is reported.

Killed by Ferocious Unknown.

TOPEKA, Kan., May 20.—The coroner's jury in the J. S. Collins murder case returned a verdict to the effect that Collins was murdered by unknown parties.

Chief Harrigan Resigns.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., May 20.—After forty years of service on the St. Louis police department, the last ten being at its head, Chief Laurence Harrigan to-day resigned his position because of ill health.

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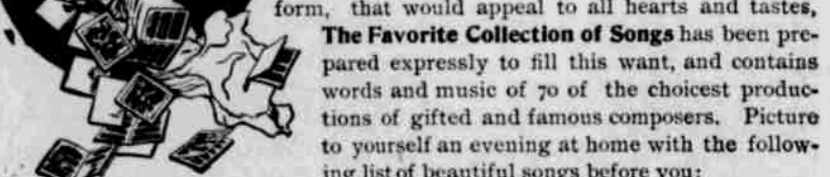
