Would Be a Good Collateral for America's War Expenses.

QUICK ACTION IS NECESSARY.

Ergent Necessity That the Spanish Colony One Estimate of the Apportionment of the Increased Army

New Yorks. May 27 .- A dispatch to: the New York Trilaine from Washington says: Extraordinary activity in the war and navy departments yesterday. which was not binited to the higher officials, but included every individual in both services, gave every indication of important and immediate developments in the conduct of the war, while an unusual secrecy served to strengthen the impression that prompt and energetic action along the whole line in the West Indies had become a question of hours rather than days. Rumors, too definite to be ignored, but impossible of official authentication, explained the remarkable hurry and bustle as due to the President's determination to have Porto Rico occupied by American soldiers without further delay. The troops, which had been concentrated at gulf ports for the invasion of Cuba, were to embark immediately on the twenty transports and, under convoy of Admiral Sampson's squadron. go at once to seize San Juan de Porto Rico and establish a permanent colonial-government in the island similar to that which General Merritt is charged with creating in the Philippines

It was said that the events of the last few days in Cuba, culminating in the uselessness to Spain of Cervera's fleet securely "corked up" at Santiago, and the destruction of untrammeled cable communication between the colonies and Madrid, gave every assurance of the speedy collapse of Spanish resistance to the inevitable, and that the United States government had awakened to the necessity of actually possessing Porto Rico before the end came. That island and the Philippines had come to be looked on as an essential recompense to the United States for its expensive intervention in behalf of Cuba's freedom, and the fear had arisen that unless they were actually secured before Cuba fell embarrassing complications, leading possibly to grave po-litical complications with European countries, might not be avoided.

With the Spanish military forces at Havana effectually isolated and without even remote hopes of reinforcements, with Spain's naval force on this side of the Atlantic completely paralyzed and with the Madrid government already tottering in its insecurity of policy, the opportunity for dealing a crushing blow through the seizure of Porto Rico was hardly to be resisted.

The military authorities expressed supreme confidence in their ability to sweep the Spaniards from Porto Rico with the men now at their command, while still reluctant to attempt the greater task of establishing a position in Cuba with the same force. With the 19,000 well equipped and seasoned regular troops gathered at Tampa, New Orleans and Mobile, and the fleet of transports already loading, many of them ready in fact to sail from those points, satisfactory assurances were given to the President that there would be no possibility of a reverse at San Juan de Porto Rico after the heavy batteries had been reduced by Sampson's ships. The withdrawal of these forces, it was shown, would leave 11,000 men, the pick of the volunteer army, at the gulf ports, while scarcely a day's journey away were the forty regiments of infantry, nine light batteries of artillery and eight troops of cavalry in the Chickamauga camp, rapidly being trained in effective corps. with the certainty of becoming speedily ready to meet any emergency that might confront the government should Cuban occupation become necessary.

When the excitement in the War department over the Porto Rican expedition was at its height the President's proclamation calling for an additional force of 75,000 men was issued. This action confirmed the prevailing impression that aggressive movements were immediately contemplated, especially as it had already become known that the authorities were agreed upon a strength of about 275,000 men to carry out the responsibilities which it had become evident that the government had already incurred. The division of this aggregate force had been determined upon at yesterday's cabinet meeting in practically the following proportions.

Philippine occupation, 25,000. Porto Rican occupation, 25,000. Cuba, 100,000. Reserve and home defense, 125,000. The estimate for the Cuban army of invasion was based on the conviction. which is now common to all authorities. both civil and military, in Washington, that order cannot be restored over that large area of territory without the presence there for some time to come of at least 100 regiments, and that little or no reliance can be placed on the capacity of Cubans for self-government for at least a year or two. As regards Porto Rico, it is not believed that the inhabitants will be able to maintain a government of their own in less than a generation, and practically the same conclusion is reached regarding the Philippine islanders.

which he says: Maximo Gonica, communder-in-chief of the Cuban army, take this opportunity. through the medium of Law Villas, which becomes wil be published once each week at the headquar view of the adoption of the constitution of the republic of Cubs and the artical intervention of the United States in our behalf to aid us in obtaining our independence which seen will recognized by all the world, I desire to make known that our soldiers no longer shall known as insurports, but as soldiers of the regular army of the republic.

"I take this occasion to remind such Cubar in service that he now has a country recognized, for which he must fight with all honor and glory. He is now a Cuban soldier and not at insurgent and will respect the rules of civilized warfare. I will order punished any chief officer or private who fails to respect the rights of our prisoners of war, and such prisoners will be restitutional army.

Our soldiers will conduct themselves in such a manner as to gain for themselves the good of-flees of our brethern of the United States, and for this reason it is my wish that the prmy of Cuba may exhibit model dislepting. I desire to impress upon you that we will not continue this war, which so gallantly has been kept up for the last three years, with the sten of revenue. We are lighting for liberty and independence and not for revenue, and I would call your attention to the fact that the history of the world shows that loss of blood has always een the price of liberty.
"Spanish soldiers have never been known to

die for honor except when they were opposed as ten to one. Their idea of honor has been to assassinate defenseless women and children whose protectors are now fighting for freedom in our army. Their idea of nonor has been to rob, to plunder. They die for honor drivking. gambling and committing crimes against hu-manity and against society, but now they will die before American and Cuban arms.

"I take this opportunity to speak thus to our people and our army that they may be encouraged and know that we now have noble allies who will aid us in our fight for freedom, which long has been deserved and which we can not see will be a reality at no distant day. I shall also from time to time. In Las Villas, communicate with you in the same manner.

IN STATE AT WESTMINSTER. In Six Hours 40,000 People Saw the Face

LONDON, May 27 .- The scenes at Westminster have been remarkably impressive since 2 o'clock this morning, when those anxious to see the face of Mr. Gladstone began to arrive. The line formed was continuallyy augmented by all classes of people, from peers, cabinet ministers, members of the House of Commons, military and naval officers and clergymen to costermongers, old and young, until 6 o'clock, when the doors were opened, the procession began to stream past the catafalque. This had lighted candles at each corner and a large gilt cross at its

By 10 o'clock it was computed that 100 persons to the minute were passing the body, and at noon over 40,000 people had already taken a last glance at face of the great statesman.

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
