### AND CAN'T POSSIBLY GET AWAY.

Thoroughly Relied On-No Word Received From Any of the Fleet Commanders. The Blockade.

Washington. May 27.-The mayal land been reconnoitering arrived. authorities have advanced another stage in their calculations on the Status of Admiral Corvera's fleet at Santiago de Caba. They not only have good reason to believe that he is bottled up, but, as an officer expressed it to-day, "the cork is in the bottle," and it is practically impossible for the fleet to make an exit from the harbor -day or night.

It is feit that this condition of the Spanish fleet is not only important from the present strategic standpoint, but of momentous consern to the entire future of the war, as the crippling of this most effective mayal force that Spain possesses will leave her such seant naval resources as to make a prolongation of the war impossible.

Admiral Cervera went to Santiago and is still there. That continues to be the view taken by the mavy department

At the same time it can now be stated that not a word has been received from either Admiral Sampson or Commodore Schley in official confirmation of the existence of this trap. It rests now, as it did two days ago, on a semi-official report coming to the Navy department from a source believed to be reliable. It was not a mayal source, nor one connected with the State department; neither did it come from press advices. It was from partis having relations with the Navy department and in a position to be accurately advised.

The naval authorities were extremely anxious to secure an official confirmation from one of the American commanders, and had this been received it would have been made public at once. But lacking this the department gave to the public all it felt warranted in giving from the facts namely an expression of belief that the Spanish fleet was in Santiago barber. This has been reinforced by the negative fact that the fleet has been seen at no other point. Still the word from Sampson and Schley is most anxiously awaited.

KEY WEST, Fla., May 26. Concerning the statement that Admiral Cervera's ships are bottled up at Santiago de Cuba, it has been accepted that Commodore Schley could maintain the blockade of the harbor there and annihilate the Spanish fleet if it should come outside. The fact that Commodore Schley is now thought to be out side of Santiago de Cuba, has given free reign to Rear Admiral Sampson. who is known to be in the Bahama channel. His known purpose was to intercept the Spanish fleet if It attempted to reach Havana. With Commodore Schley at Santiago de Cuba. Rear Admiral Sampson would be in the position to proceed eastward and effect a junction of the two powerful squadrons or return to Havana and resume operations in that vicinity. It is now accepted as a fact that Commodore Schley is to be permitted to work out the problem off Santiago.

Commodore Watson is supposed to be on duty along the northern and west ern coast of the island.

#### A SPANISH VIEW OF MANILA.

The Victory Explained by the Sad State of Spain's Fleet.

Hoxa Koxa, May 27.—Captain Concha of the ill fated Don Juan de Austria. destroyed at the battle of Manila, says that the Spanish commanders were quite aware that fighting was hopeless. but were forced to it by the state of public opinion at Manila. He and other officers wished to steam out of the harbor to meet the Americans, but Admiral Montejo forbade that move.

Captain Concha says the Spanish fleet was in a disgraceful condition. The engines of the cruiser Don Antonio de Ulloa were broken; the Castilla was leaking and needed engines to keep the water under; the Don Juan de Austria had only two guns that could be fired; the Marques del Duero had only one gun, while the Isla de Cuba and the Isla de Luzon had only their decks protected.
