

A "HOLY WAR" COMING SOON.

Such is the Roman Catholic Opinion of Admiral Schley's Niros.

Jamestown, Wis., Sept. 24th. 1908.—Editor The American: Dear Sir—I enclose you herewith a clipping from the Milwaukee Sentinel.

Comment upon the article is hardly necessary, still, in view of the fact that we are surrounded by this element of "Americans" it may not be out of place to caution the readers of your valuable edition, that we must be on the alert to meet just such exigencies as may result from this and similar meetings of some of our so-called Americans.

The reference to General Lee is, to say the least, a contemptible sally, and we genuine Americans mean what we say, when we mention General Lee's name with just pride, and believe that all honor conferred upon him by this government has been well merited. It is sadly deplorable that we have so few of the "Lee type" of material in our army and navy.

There are few Americans, who will believe that the blowing up of the Maine is attributable to "American Jingoism." No doubt there are some "American Jingoists," but an investigation would develop the fact that the outbreak of the late war, they were found among the "peace at any price" men.

New York, Sept. 22.—Miss Jessie Schley of Milwaukee, whose cousin helped to crush Cervera's fleet, is in New York. She has just returned from Cuba and she says some curious things about the war and her remarkable part in it.

"When I first began to agitate against war with Spain" she said, "I wrote to Cousin Scott and asked him not to fire the first shot. He wrote back and asked me if he had my permission to fight if the Spaniards shot at him first. I told him if he thought he was right, to go ahead. He is a sailor and a good one. I am proud of him. He did his duty, but it was an unholy war just the same. Spartan women used to urge their men to war. It is for American women to urge their men to peace.

"How did I first come to take such an active interest in the peace movement? Well, it came upon me in a moment of prayer. I was kneeling in the little Corpus Christi Chapel in Paris. Tell the public I was kneeling in a Spanish church, and led the enemies of peace make the most of it. God does not love a good Spaniard less than a good American and He judges nations with the same exactitude that He does individuals.

"While praying, she thought came to me that American women must stop the war. I went to work and organized at once the Women's International League for Peace. In three weeks the league had 3,000 members, mostly Protestants. Our first meeting was held in the home of Cornelius Vanderbilt's brother-in-law. Then a general peace convention was held at which five principal peace organizations of Europe were represented. I was elected a committee of one to go to Madrid and inform the queen regent and Senor Sagasta that they were whipped. Senor Moret received me kindly and showed me many courtesies while I was in Spain. The Spanish public knew I was a Roman Catholic and a friend of Spain, that I detested the war, so I had no trouble in securing listeners."

"Do you know who destroyed the Maine?"

"It wasn't the Spaniards. It was some of our American jingoists, who entered into a conspiracy with the Cuban jingoists for the purpose of setting Spain and the United States at each other's throats. I know this assertion will create a storm but it is the truth. Why should they hesitate to destroy a few American lives and a great warship when they were plotting of war that meant the slaughter of thousands. Born in wickedness, I should say it was. I went to Havana and after paying my

respects to Gen. Bacon and the other Spanish officials, I went to an insurgent camp. They had been creating a disturbance and my fighting blood was up. I used plain language with them. I told them that if they did not quit fighting, we would cut their throats and annex Cuba. They quit.

"Gen. Fitzhugh Lee is a firebrand. He should not be sent to Cuba. The host of Spaniards and Cubans dislike him. They say his coming will create trouble. It is time for the best element of this country to assert itself, and put the Lees in the background.

"Now, I am not opposed to war. The time may come when we will have to fight in a good cause. Then I will be found no advocate of peace until it is properly won.

But no more disgraceful, unholy war like this has been. I am an old maid, but were I married and the mother of a son I would not send him to West Point or Annapolis. If any one is interested in it tell them I am a Roman Catholic. My father isn't yet. Few of my family are. I am a good American. This is the best country on earth."

Roman Bombast.

"The time has passed for Catholics in this country to be obliged to proclaim their patriotism upon every occasion," said Archbishop Feehan at the banquet given yesterday afternoon by the priests of the archdiocese to Rev. Edward A. Kelly, chaplain of the Seventh Regiment.

"The patriotism of the catholic in his country," added the archbishop, "and his loyalty to the flag has been proved for a hundred years and more. He is a loyal citizen and can say to everyone, 'I am as good as you.'"

The utterances of the archbishop were received with cheers by the 125 priests present at the feast, which was held in the banquet hall of the Auditorium hotel. It was the expression of the brotherly feeling of the priests of Chicago to father Kelly in their cordial welcome to his return to his parish.

From the capitals of the polished hard wood pillars of the banquet hall hung silken flags. Above these were portraits of the men who have made the nation famous Washington, Lincoln, Grant, McKinley, Dewey, Sampson, Lee, Shafter, Schley, Miles, Wheeler and Hobson.

The archbishop with Father Kelly on his right hand sat at the center of a long table from which extended three other tables at right angles to it. Rev. F. S. Henneberry, the toastmaster, was at the end of the middle table at the other end of the hall and facing the archbishop.

The banquet was served shortly after 1 o'clock and it was 3 before the speech-making began. Toastmaster Father Henneberry in rapping for order expressed the pleasure of the clergy in gathering to greet a warrior priest.

The archbishop, in responding to the welcome of the toastmaster, said it gave him delight to meet with the priests, and especially upon an occasion like the present. He said the Catholic prelate was ever ready at the call of duty to serve the church in time of peace and time of war. In the war so quickly brought to a close the Catholic people of the United States, declared the archbishop, had been quick to respond to the country's call. He then asserted that the time had passed for Catholics to proclaim their patriotism. In conclusion the archbishop said the experience of Father Kelley in the army would be of great help to him in his church work.

"Home, Sweet Home," was sung by the priests, and Rev. Father Bryne of St. Mary's church welcomed Father Kelly back to the archdiocese. He said there was never a period in the nation's history where the Catholic priest was not found to be a patriot.

In the present war he had gone with his people to the camp and battle-field, and Father Edward A. Kelly, he said was a notable example of the warrior priest.

Father Kelly in responding to the welcome praised the Seventh Regiment as one of the best in the service. He said his experience in the camp had been a fruitful one. He deplored the fact that there were not more priests in the army. In Camp Alger, with 30,000 soldiers, one-third of whom were Catholics, he was for a time the only priest. The three regiments having Catholic priests—the Seventh Illinois, Ninth Massachusetts and Fourth Missouri—

their Father Kelly were recognized by their church and church members. While the Young Men's Christian Association furnished seats for him in the assembly and lounge in the regiments with other chaplains, the Catholic regiments were almost completely forgotten. He expressed the hope that the church in the future would see that its members in the army were so helped and that the soldier would ever feel that his church had a constant interest in his life. The devotion of the Catholic soldiers, concealed the chaplains, was something remarkable. When church call was sounded Sunday 1,300 men marched out into the grave and field, where mass was said.
