WHAT NICOTINE REALLY IS.

A Catoriess Field That Becomes Dark

Whee Exposed to the Air.

In a communication about tobacco in the current number of the Scientific American, Prof. John W. Mallet of the university of Virginia says among other things: Ignorance of easily ascertainable scientific facts is, however, common enough, as is often illustrated by the brown, oily material formed in the nicotine, though in reality this is merely the tar produced by the action of heat on the woody fiber of the leaf. Nicotine when pure is a colorless fluid of somewhat oily consistence and strong, peculiar, penetrating odor, but it darkens on exposure to air and light, becoming first yellow and then brown, so that it looks, in this dark.
