Hoosier Prohibitionists Nominate a Full State Ticket.

THIRD PARTY FIGHT IN KANSAS.

Harrison Man Withdraw, Leaving Blatce Men in Possession of the Indiana Convention-Tennessee Democrats Instruct for Cleveland Other Politics.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 27 .- The In. diana Prohibitionists put a full state ticket in the field and adjourned. The platform adopted declares for prohibition, for government control of railways and telegraphs, for the removal of tariff from necessities, against alien land ownership, for more rigid immigration and naturalization laws, for election of senators by popular vote, for postal savings banks, for prohibition of grain and stock speculation and for pensions. Its financial plank declares,
"That the general government, without
the intervention of banks should issue the circulating medium, of a sufficient volume for the transaction of the busines of the country in a manner which will be just to the debtor as well as the creditor class. Said circulation medium to consist of gold and silver coin and United States treasury notes, each to be a full legal tender for all debts, public and private and each to be taxable." Following is the ticket nominated: Governor-Aaron Worth.

Will Stand by Grover. NASHVILLE, Tenn., May 27 .- W. H. Dismukes of Sumner county, an ardent supporter of Mr. Cleveland, was made permanent chairman of the Democratic convention. The congressional districts announced the delegates to Chicago. The platform declares for state economy; that no money should be collected except for governmental purposes; against centralization, bounties and sub-sidies; declares as impracticable and illusory all such schemes as the subtreasury land loan, governmental ownership of railroads, and the expenditures of the last congress are denounced as wasteful and corrupt. The passage of the McKinley act is denounced as a base surrender to trusts, and reciprocity is declared a temporizing policy and a sop thrown to New England. It was declared that the pension bureau had grown into a machine for the distribution of party spoils. The money plank declares for a party of gold and silver so that every dollar shall be equal to every other dollar. Grover Cleveland's administration is endorsed and the deleadministration is endorsed and the delegates are instructed to vote for him so long as his name is before the convention. Peoples' Party Fight in Kansas.

TOPEKA, Kan., May 27.-There are prospects for a fine row in the Peoples' Party ranks in this state. John F. Willits, the noted leader and national lecturer of the Farmers' Alliance, has been sidetracked by those he has con-sidered his friends here and he is very angry and threatens dire vengeance. Before he went away his name was prominently mentioned in connection with the head of the state ticket, but during his absence friends of other candidates have been busy circulating re-ports that Willits did not want the gubernatorial nomination. The result is that he was shelved in favor of other aspirants. Mr. Willits returned yesterday and when he learned how he had been treated there was a hurried consul-tation of Peoples' Party leaders, but with what results can not be learned. Mr. Willits refused to disclose his plans, but if he does not get the nomination a big split in the party may result.

Blaine and Harrison Men Split. FORT WAYNE, Ind., May 27.-The Republican congressional convention of the Twelfth district met in this city, and after a two hours wrangle ended in a split. The Harrison forces withdrew, leaving the Blaine men in full possession of the field. A resolution was passed annulling the election of Judge W. L. Penfield of Auburn as delegate to the national convention, which took place at a convention held in Auburn two months ago, and R. T. McDonald of Fort Wayne was elected in his place. Resolutions were adopted instructing the delegates to the national convention from this district "to cast their ballots for James G. Blaine as long as there is any hope that he will be nominated. People's Party in Indiana.

INDIANAPOLIS, May 27 .- The People's Party holds its state convention in this city today. Following the practice of the older parties in Indiana the district meetings were held last night, at which the members of the various committees were elected. The movement is not regarded as nearly so strong this year in Indiana as it was two years ago, and it is a notable fact that it is now composed almost wholly of the same men who led the Greenback movement which once

He has reconsidered his letter to Mr. Clarkson, and while he will not write a letter announcing this fact, neither will he write one declining the nomination."

California Prohibitionists.

FRESNO, Cal., May 27.—The Prohibition state convention adopted a platform which in addition to favoring prohibition of the sale of liquors, etc., favors government ownership and operation of railroads, currency issued by the government alone in gold, silver and treasury notes not exceeding \$50 per capita, good for all debts; stringent immigration laws, an extension of time of residence for naturalization, the government building and operating the Nicaragua canal, and the election of United States senators by direct vote.
