Twenty-Four Years Ago.

In the course of an interesting sketch, Bishop Newman gives the following striking picture of early days: "From the general conference of 1865, held in Chicago, fifty of us came to Omaha for an excursion on the Union Pacific railroad to Laramie, as far as the road was then completed. Onward we went; day after day we rode along the Platte over the virgin prairies. Indians and immigrants, antelopes and buffaloes, prairie dogs and prairie chickens attracted our attention. At nightfall we reached Laramie, a cluster of tents. The next morning, Laramie was not; during the night the tents were folded and moved five miles beyond to the end of a new section just completed." COUNTY COURT RULES.

MAY TERM, 1892.

The court will be made convenient to all, to suit the convenience of the parties at the trial, will stand constituted by agreement of parties.

No. 1. All cases not answered to by attorney or parties at the trial, will stand constituted by agreement of parties.

No. 2. In all cases which are set for trial, it is desirable to have the attorney give a short statement in order to inform the court as to about the length of time it will take to try the case.

No. 3. Cases in which issues are not joined will not be set for trial unless for special reasons it is ordered otherwise.

No. 4. All cases will be set for hearing within the term, unless for special reasons it is otherwise ordered.

No. 5. All cases will be set for trial in the order in which they appear on the docket, unless the parties agree upon a time when the case is called, or for special reasons the court shall order otherwise. Default cases will be set for the morning hour.

No. 6. The business each day will commence at 9:00 a.m.

No. 7. The morning hour will be from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m.

The morning hour will be devoted to (1) motions, demurrers, and default cases set for that day.

(2) To motions, demurrers, and default cases which have previously passed on their regular day and transferred on the calendar to this day.

No. 8. After a case, a motion or a demurrer has passed the time for which it is set, it cannot be called up until a motion is filed and docketed by leave of the court, and such notice to the opposite party as the court may order at the time leave is given to file the motion.

No. 9. Business set for a certain time, cannot be transferred to another day or hour, unless the transfer order is made at the hour the matter is set for hearing, except under Rule 10.

No. 10. Each day at 9:00 a.m. the business of the hour will be called.

No. 11. The matters will be heard in the order in which they are entered on the calendar, unless all parties present and interested consent to a different arrangement, or in case of urgent necessity.

TRIAL OF CASES TO-DAY.

No. 12. The trial of cases will commence at ten o'clock a.m. and continue until 5:00 o'clock p.m. with a recess from 12:00 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. Each case is entitled to be called at the time set or within ten minutes thereafter; either to be proceeded with, or a further order to be made. For this purpose no witness or the opposite party, or other business, except for urgencies, will be admitted to the trial of a case, suspended at any time, except for this purpose.

No. 13. In case the court finds that any rule herein will work an unseasonable hardship, the court reserves the right to suspend the rule for the special case.

Sheriff's Sale.

By virtue of an execution issued by Frank E. Bennett, Sheriff of Douglas County, Nebraska, in favor of the District Court for Douglas County, Nebraska, and to me directed, I will on the 22nd day of June, A. D. 1892, at 10 o'clock A. M. of said day, at the EAST front door of the County Court House, in the City of Omaha, Douglas County, Nebraska, sell at public auction the property described in said order of sale as follows, to-wit:

No. 14. The business of the corporation shall be Drummond Carriage Company, and its principal place of business shall be Omaha, Nebraska.

No. 15. The business of this corporation shall be in the manufacturing of carriages, wagons, sleighs and harness of all kinds and makes, also the repairing and painting of carriages and wagons.

No. 16. The corporation shall begin June 2nd, 1892, and continue and exist until June 22d, 1892, unless sooner dissolved by process of law or the unanimous consent of the stockholders.

The capital stock of the corporation shall be \$10,000 divided into 150 shares of \$66 each, ten thousand of which shall be paid in before the commencement of business.

Article 5. The corporation may acquire, hold, mortgage, lease, rent and convey such real estate as may be necessary for the carrying on of its business.

Article 6. The business of the corporation shall be conducted by a board of three directors, one of whom to be chosen by the board of directors, shall act as president, and one of whom, to be chosen by the board of directors, shall act as secretary and treasurer.

Stock directors shall be chosen annually by the stockholders at their annual meeting, which shall be held at the offices of the corporation on the 2nd day of January, immediately after the adjournment of said stockholders' meeting, the directors shall elect the officers.

The directors and officers so elected shall hold their respective offices until the next regular annual meeting of the stockholders and directors, or until their successors are elected.

A special meeting of the directors of the corporation shall be held at the office of the corporation on June 2nd, 1892, for the election of officers and adoption of by-laws.

Article 7. The corporation shall at no time incur indebtedness in excess of two-thirds of its paid-up capital stock.

Article 8. These articles may be amended by a two-thirds vote of all the stockholders at any meeting called for that purpose.

Article 9. The proposed amendment must be made by the stockholders, together with notice of the time and place of said meeting at least thirty days before such meeting, and such notice shall be signed by the president and secretary. Like notices of the annual meeting shall be given.
