

Roman Catholic Arrogance.

True, it was the church of Rome that, during the dark ages, kept the lamp of learning from being entirely extinguished, but she kept the masses in boundless ignorance.

It is true on the other hand that for thousands years during the dark ages the Bible could not be read by the masses because Rome printed it in the Latin, a language that could not be read by the common people.

Ignorance follows in the wake of Roman Catholic supremacy, as the hungry wolf follows the scent of blood. In Italy seventy-three per cent. of the people are illiterate; in Spain, eighty per cent.; and in Mexico ninety-three per cent. The Roman Catholic religion thrives in the marshes of moral corruption. It flourishes like a "green bay tree" in the cesspool of ignorance and vice. It revels in the hotbed of illiteracy. It grows most rapidly where the conscience of the worshipper (?) is bound by the dictates of the Roman pontiff. The active principle of this arrogant hierarchy is clearly expressed in the following papal utterance:

"I acknowledge no civil power; I am the subject of no prince, and I claim more than this. I claim to be supreme judge and director of the consciences of men; of the peasant that tills the fields, and of the prince that sits upon the throne; of the household that sits in the shades of privacy, and the legislator that makes laws for the kingdom; I am the sole, last supreme judge of what is right and wrong."

Moreover, we declare, affirm, define, and pronounce it to be necessary to salvation for every human creature to be subject to the Roman pontiff.

Much more might be quoted along this same line, but one more, the most degrading and devilish, the sum of all villainy must suffice. Cardinal Belarmino says: "If the pope should ever be enjoining vice or forbidding virtue, the church would be obliged to believe it to be good, and virtues bad, unless it would sin against conscience."

The man who reads these fundamental principles of this "ten-horned beast" and cannot see that there is an irrepressible conflict going on between this would-be master and all free speech, free press, free schools and free government is too blind to appreciate the plainest argument. Let this unprincipled power get a firm hold in America and our free institutions are doomed. Let this great red dragon wield the ecclesiastical scepter over our proud republic to the extent that men will be thrown into the bastile, "because forsight they toss not high the ready cap in the air, nor lift up their voice in servile shouts at sight of that great ruffian" (the pope), and the wheels of progress will turn backward, the lights of literature and science will burn dimly, the fires of persecution will be rekindled, the guillotine will be run by steam, and blood will flow to the bridle bits. With this end in view the Roman church in the United States is storing up power, that may, ere long, burst upon us with its terrible and unrelenting fury.

From 1869 to 1880 the authorities of New York City gave the Roman church real estate valued at \$3,000,000, and money to the amount of \$5,827,471 is exchanged for Romish votes.

Catholic wealth increased in the United States from \$9,000,000 in 1850 to \$24,000,000 in 1860, and to \$60,000,000 in 1870, and being claimed as church property, this enormous sum is exempt from taxation. The following Catholic predictions may never be fulfilled—but they are wonderfully indicative and ought to cause us to double our picket line.

In 1870 Father Hecker said: "There is no longer to be a state religion in this country, and that state religion is to be Roman Catholic."

The Boston Pilot speaks: "The man today is living who will see a majority of the people of the American continent Roman Catholic."

A bishop of Charleston declares that "within thirty years the Protestant heresy will come to an end."

That we may know something near the truth of these predictions let us consult the figures. In 1800 the Catholics numbered 100,000. In 1884 they were 6,628,176 strong.

In 1800 there was one Catholic to every 53; in 1850 one to every 14.8; in 1870 one to 8.3; and in 1880 one to every 7.7 of the whole population.

Make your calculation and see how long it will take this ratio of increase to put the Catholics in the majority, and fulfill the Boston Pilot's prophecy.

I am told that in every Catholic convent and nunnery in this country there is one or more rooms into which none but a Catholic official of high rank is permitted to enter. Who knows these rooms are stored with Winter rifles? Do you laugh at this? Let Cardinal McCloskey speak: "The Catholics of the United States are as strongly devoted to the

existence and maintenance of the temporal power of the holy father as Catholics in any part of the world; and if it should be necessary to prove it by act they are ready to do so."—Brighton Truth Seeker.

Should be looked into. A writer in the New York Christian Advocate asks:

"Will some one familiar with the law of the state of New York kindly explain why the parsonage property of Protestant churches is subject to taxation, while that of the Roman Catholic church is free? If the one is taxed, why not the other? It seems strange that an Episcopal residence on Madison avenue, occupied by a Roman Catholic prelate and his household, should be exempt from all city taxes, while the house of a Protestant clergyman, though adjoining the church building and a part of the church property, must meet its annual assessments. To say that the one is more thoroughly devoted to church purposes than the other would not be the exact truth, for what with baptisms, weddings and church meetings, generally, the Protestant parsonage belongs essentially to the church edifice. It is full time that something should be done in a matter of such gravity as this."

The parsonage tax which Methodism has to pay in the city of New York would maintain two or three churches, and relief from it would be a material help to some of our struggling congregations. There are times when patience ceases to become a virtue, and it is nothing less than a burning shame that in the metropolis of this nation Protestantism has to pay such a tax, while Romanism is exempt from it. A pilgrimage to Plymouth Rock will soon be a national necessity."
