

MIKE WALSH'S LIES.

He Waves Against the A. P. A. and Ignores the Truth of Course.

The editor of the Catholic Herald and the Sunday Democrat, Michael Walsh, adds another and one of the most infamous lies to those numerous Roman Catholic falsehoods which have been uttered since the papists have become terrorized by the patriotic movement now spreading all over the country.

Before penning such charges against the A. P. A., Walsh must have been reading the ironclad oath of the A. O. H., or that oath of the Clana-Gael gang of cut-throats, perhaps the oaths of the priests and bishops of his church, or that of the secret order of Jesuits.

It is rather amusing to observe, in this connection, that, in the opinion of the Romanish editor, to be "champions of the Protestant Bible" is an awful sin; but the "vicars of satan," the A. P. A., do not see it in that light, and have seen fit to adopt the Protestant Bible in preference to the Roman Catholic, or papal counterfeit.

The A. P. A.'s Principles.

- 1. Nationality is not a bar to membership in the order. No man is asked where he was born.
2. We interfere with no man's partisan politics.
3. We attack no man's religion, so long as he does not attempt to make religion an element of political power.
4. We unite to protect our country and its free institutions against the secret, intolerant and aggressive efforts that are persistently being set forth by a certain religio-political organization to control the government of the United States and destroy our blood-bought civil and religious liberty.
5. We are in favor of preserving constitutional liberty and maintaining the government of the United States.
6. We regard all religio-political organizations as the enemies of civil and religious liberty.
7. It is, in our opinion, unwise and unsafe to appoint or elect to civil, political or military office in this country, men who owe supreme allegiance to any foreign king, potentate or ecclesiastical power, and who are sworn to obey such power.
8. We are in favor of maintaining the principle of ONE general unsectarian free school organization, and will oppose all attempts to supplant it by any sectarian institution.
9. We are opposed to all attempts, local or national, to use public funds for any sectarian purpose.
10. We are in favor of laws taxing all church property.
11. We are in favor of changing our immigration laws in such manner that they will protect our citizen laborers from the evil influences of cheap pauper and criminal labor, which through the instrumentality of European propagandist societies, and in this country by the aid of strikes, and the subtle influence of priests, are rapidly supplanting our free and educated American citizen in every line of industry.
12. We believe there should be an educational qualification to the elective franchise that will require every "American citizen" to be Americanized.
13. We are in favor of putting into office honest and true patriots, who are best qualified to fill the position regardless of political parties.
14. We are willing to be governed by those principles in our future political action.
15. Our mission is to awaken the people of free America from their lethargy, indifference and over-confidence. "Eternal vigilance is the price of liberty," yet the Protestants of this republic have ceased to be vigilant, and in conscious strength are either intently chasing the slighly dollar, or quietly dozing, while we swiftly drift toward a more tremendous and terrible crisis than this country has yet known.

The Pope Has Gone Back on Satolli's Scheme.

NEW YORK, April 15.—The morning Journal has the following: The startling intelligence reached this city yesterday from Rome, officially stating that the pope had receded from the position taken by Mgr. Satolli last November in respect to the toleration by the Catholic church of the American public schools. The arch-bishop opposed the whole fourteen propositions of the apostolic delegate and

voiced a storm, especially about the famous sixth proposition, which declared that the Catholic church, while reserving to herself the right to give instructions in faith and morals, saw nothing wrong in permitting Catholic children leaving the first elements, or even the higher branches, of the arts and sciences in schools controlled by the state. The pope was recently induced to take a poll of the American bishops upon the question of the sixth proposition, and it is said that the verdict was seventy-four to fifteen against the Satolli scheme.

THE CLARA ALLEN CASE.

The case of the State of Nebraska against Clara Allen, for perjury, occupied a week of Judge Keyser's time and was given to the jury Tuesday night. Attorneys J. W. Carr and Judge Bowman endeavored to prove that Miss Allen told the truth by proving that C. P. Miller was murdered. They introduced witnesses to corroborate her testimony in many places. Several witnesses swore that they found tracks leading down from the west bank where she says she saw a man stand and shoot; others swore to hearing a shot fired—though the time differed, being one and a quarter to one and a half hours earlier in the day; men were seen there who answered her description; five physicians swore that in their opinion the wound which caused death could not have been self-inflicted; and an expert with fire-arms practically demonstrated that it would be absolutely impossible for a man to shoot himself without burning the skin or filling it with powder.

After all the evidence had been introduced the attorneys made their arguments against and in behalf of the defendant. County Attorney Raley made a great effort—no man with similar facts staring him in the face could have done better. He was followed by Judge Bowman, who made a forcible and eloquent plea for his client, marshaling his points in a masterly manner. When he had finished his argument J. W. Carr took the jury in hand and made the closing address for the defendant. He brought out vividly the most important points made by the defense and wondered, sarcastically, "how it came that Hayes ate dinner on this particular day of all other days with his sister; and how it could have been on this day when they had not only admitted it was 'washday,' but that their 'washday was Monday?'" Mr. Troup followed Mr. Carr in a lengthy harangue, abusing not only the prisoner but every person who dared to think that Miller had been murdered, terming them wolves, hyenas, etc., and lauding Hayes and Berlin, two self-convinced lawbreakers, for their many good qualities.

When he finished it was 5:15 Tuesday evening, and the jury had failed to agree up to twelve o'clock today. It is reported it stands 10 for acquittal and 2 for conviction—about the way public sentiment stands.
