Papal Statistics.

The Quincy, Ill., Journal has obtained a copy of Hoffman's Catholic directory, the German official year book of the Catholic church of the United States. From the very interesting statistics the following totals are taken: The total Catholic population of the United States is 8,306,695; there are 14 archbishops and 75 bishops, and hence 14 archdioceses and 75 dioceses; there are 9,388 clergymen, of which 6,495 are secular and 2,443 regular; the total number of churches is 8,477; there are 3,485 stations and 1,763 chapels; there are 463 charitable institutions; there are 245 orphan asylums and 26,533 orphans; the number of parochial schools is 3,587, and there are 738,269 children attending parochial schools. There are 36 seminaries, 127 colleges, 656 academies and 1,843 secular students.

First—Pick out seven or more of your friends who are earnest, conscientious, loyal Protestant Americans, who favor the principles published elsewhere by the state president of the A. P. A. in Nebraska. Second—Have them sign a blank application for a charter which you can draft in about the following form: J. S. Hatfield, Columbus, Neb., state president of the A. P. A. in Nebraska; We the undersigned citizens of [name your town] and of the United States, believing in the principles set forth over your signature, would respectfully petition you to grant us a warrant or dispensation for the organization of a council of the A. P. A. in this town. Third—State the night you will be ready for the organization. Fourth—The initiation fee is usually placed at \$2 and the dues at 50c per year. Fifth—Care should be taken in the selection of charter members, as men are quite often taken in as charter members who had better have been kept outside altogether.
