He stated that on account of the stories in circulation he would probably surrender charge of the flock. He would visit Bishop Hortsman the next day, and apprise him of all the circumstances. This statement, though unheralded occasioned but little surprise. The priest visited the bishop Monday morning, returning to his nome in the evening and passing the night there.
