

SIMS AT WASHBURN.

A Papist Mob Allowed to Intimidate and Insult Citizens by a Papist Marshal,
WASHBURN, Wis., Jan. 13. 1894.

This town has perhaps witnessed such a shaking up as it never before experienced. On Wednesday evening Prof. Walter Sims, of Michigan, delivered a lecture in the opera house, which was packed to its utmost capacity. He spoke on the subject, "Who are True Americans?" His lecture was an eye-opener to many of our sleepy Protestants, and a bad exposé of Rome's schemes to overthrow Protestantism in this country. Our town is run by Roman Catholics, and what is worse still, their unprincipled so-called Protestant sympathizers. The Washburn News, a paper that represents that style of newspaper whose political policy is best represented by a "good Lord, good devil" service, with the balances very decidedly over on the papist devil's side, came out in a column report in praise of the Roman Catholics. The article accused the professor of abusing the pope, cardinals, bishops and priests, but failed to print proofs which were adduced to show that no "good Catholic" can be a good American citizen. This paper misrepresented on the one hand what the professor stated, while on the other it said things calculated to encourage the priest in his iniquity of his ignorant dupes.

As many were disappointed in being unable to get in the house to hear the first lecture, a second one was announced for Friday evening. Upon it becoming known that the professor was going to speak on the "Public vs. the Parochial Schools," a number of Roman Catholic town officials and their Protestant, unprincipled, office-seeking politicians got together, no doubt, to consider ways and means to prevent the next lecture. Threats were prevalent, and boasts that the lecture would not take place, and dark mutterings intimated that the professor would not get out of town alive, etc.

When Friday evening came, however, the house was again filled with our most intelligent citizens. A mob began to gather in and about the saloons, which here, as elsewhere, are largely kept by papists. It was evident that trouble had been determined upon. People, as they passed to the hall, had to run the gauntlet of a stream of vile utterances, such as no other institution except the mother of harlots and abominations could teach its members to use. Utterances were used such as could emanate from no other vice-laden system than that of papal corruption. When the professor left his hotel, in company with a number of friends, to go to the hall, he met a crowd of people, who had gathered up, "Here he comes!" interspersed with vile utterances, etc. His presence, however, seemed to cow their spirits, and he passed into the hall without being molested.

The opening of the meeting seemed to be a signal for howls and threats, and Romish billingsgate and curses that must have made St. Torquemada and the army of holy inquisitors turn over in their graves with envy. In the mob were half-naked, whisky-pickled papists, and Irish Roman Catholic pugilists, with a sprinkling of other nationalities. The marshal, O'Sullivan, a papist bully, as he proved himself to be, aided and abetted the un-American display of Romish vice and ignorance. It was altogether one of the most practical object-lessons, illustrating what the Roman Catholic church is doing for American civilization that could possibly be presented. It was a "world's fair" to our best citizens, revealing the fruits of Roman Catholicism.

The professor, before he began his lecture, drew attention very sarcastically to the fact that the parish priest had provided him very kindly with a company of his church graduates, to serve as an example of what that church could produce in their parochial schools. "This is a fitting illustration," remarked the speaker, "of what our nation is coming to under Roman Catholic control." He continued: "I have read the report published in the *News* of your town, and especially that part which states that I made charges without giving any proof. This statement I pronounce an unqualified falsehood." At this point he reproduced his proof of the previous lecture, called upon persons in the audience to examine it, which they did, and pronounced it genuine. "Out of Rome's own mouth we condemn her," said the professor.

During the lecture, a call was made for a prominent doctor who was in the hall. It was afterwards discovered that an A. P. A. had been set upon and that his shoulder had been broken. The marshal had been called, and his Roman Catholic assistants appealed to, but they were on the other side. The mob remained out in the hall and upon the street until the lecture was over. The whole affair was one that illustrated the need of the A. P. A. to secure American citizens for office, who are not the servants of priests and the obsequious subjects of the pope of Rome. The next election will see that men are put on guard who will do their duty. The aiders and abettors of riot will find themselves adjudged both un-American and treasonous, and condemned to private life.

The professor stated that mob law and riot are the only weapons of de-

stroy that Romish priests have at their command. They have not face the truth. They have nothing with which to disprove the charges that are made against their religious political systems.

My advice to you, Mr. Peeler, is teach a little more morality to your people out of the book you call the Protestant Bible and it will be better for you, for this world and the world to come. Your convent prisons and your celibate priests are a disgrace to the name of religion, and as it stands you endorse it.
