The price of \$50 made mg wish for a copy to use as evidence to convince the tax payers that they are being swindled by E. D. Satterlee, with the consent and help of the county board. I finially obtained a copy of the docket and presented it to W. E. Patterson asking him what would be a fair price per 100 copies for furnishing and printing the same, and in reply be said that \$7.50 would be good pay. Mr. L. O. Hull, also a practical printer, says that \$7 or \$8 would be good pay for the job. Mr. Jon Linderman, also a practical printer, said \$25 would be big pay. But Mr. Satterlee presents a bill for \$50 and the same is paid without a word-without even asking him to deliver the goods. For further information I asked Mr. C. F. Slingerland, then foreman of the Herald office, how many copies of the docket he had printed and he said fifty copies. Mr. Slingerland is the man who did the work and ought to know. What did the county want with 100 copies anyway-or even 50? They are only to be furnished to the attorneys in attendance and the officers of the court.
