> The legislature of Nebraska will soon be called upon to revise our election laws. The ballot system in force in this state, as well as in the other states of the country, is faulty. Efforts are being made in various commonwealths to purge elections of their bad elements. In Massachusetts and in New York measures have brought before their respective legislatures to correct elective methods. The reforms are modelled upon what is termed the "Australian ballot system." Under this method ballots are printed by didates for one office are printed on the same lallot and each voter marks his choice in a room by himself. This is a guaranty of secrecy.
