The manufacture of paper is a very interesting study, to look at the rags as For Sale - The yard and stock of The they are cut up by a rag cutter, then put into a tumbler, which is a hollow taper cone covered with wire, into which the rags are carried by an endless apron: from the tumbler they go to what paper makers call a devil, or, as refined people say, railroad duster or thresher. This is a closed machine, into which the rags are fed at one end. The inside of this machine is provided with five or six heads or cylinders resembling the cylinders of a threshing machine.

These cylinders thresh and beat the rags very much in their passage through the machine, and dump them out at the end. They are next placed in a rag boiler, which contains a chemical solution, The oyster supper in connection with and in which the rags are boiled.
