Central Committees Meet.

As per call the central committees of
both political parties met in Harrison on
last Friday. The democratic committee
met at the court house and the republi-
can one at the HERALD office.

The latter arranged to hold a conven-
tion and the number of delegates decided
upon as will be seen by the call publish-
ed elsewhere in THE JOURNAL.

At about this time a delegation from
the democratic committee came in and
communicated with the chairman, who
shortly after announced to the body as-
sembled that the democrats had decided
not to hold a convention and wished a
committee appointed to confer with a
like committee of democrats as to the
course to be pursued. On motion a
committee of five was appointed to con-
fer with the democratic committee and
the result was that a call was issued
containing the following remarkable
clause:

"All those who have not taken part in
any previous primary or convention this
year, and can affiliate with the Republi-
cans for the selection and election of
good and efficient officers, that whole-
some government may be assured, are
invited to attend the primaries and assist
in the selection of delegates to the Re-
publican County Convention."

Report of the Meeting of the County Central Committee.

The following is the report of the
meeting of the county central com-
mittee as furnished by the secretary:

The republican electors of Sioux coun-
ty, Nebraska, are requested to hold their
precinct primary election on Wednesday,
October 2, 1889, for the purpose of elec-
ting delegates to a county convention to
be held in the court house in the village
of Harrison, Neb., on Friday, the 4th
day of October, 1889, at the hour of 11
a. m.

Said convention will put in nomination
for county offices, nominees for the coun-
ty offices following in the order named:

County Clerk.
County Treasurer.
County commissioner, 3d district.
County Commissioner, 3d district.
County Sheriff.
County Judge.
County Superintendent of Public In-
struction.
County Surveyor.
County Coroner.

And thereafter the election of dele-
gates to the state convention, and the
election of a county central committee,
and to transact such other business as
may properly come before said republi-
can county convention of October 4, 1889.

The several precincts are instructed to
hold their primaries to select delegates
on the day above mentioned (Wednesday,
October 2), at such hour of the day and
at such place as may be designated by
the committeeman in the call posted for
each precinct. All those who have not
taken part in any previous primary or
convention this year, and can affiliate
with the republicans for the selection
and election of good and efficient officers,
that wholesome government may be as-
sured, are invited to attend the primar-
ies and assist in the selection of dele-
gates to the republican county conven-
tion.

The several precincts are entitled to
representation as follows, based on the
vote cast for Presidential Elector Hast-
ings at the last general election, giving
one delegate-at-large for each precinct
and one for each ten votes and major
fraction thereof:

Andrews—1 Hat Creek—2
Antelope—2 Lower Rinnickwater—2
Bodare—4 Montross—2
Bowen—4 Runningwater—2
Cottonwood—6 Warbonnet—2
Five Points—3 White River—4

Total number of delegates—25
The following was passed:

The republican county central com-
mittee of Sioux county, Neb., at a meet-
ing held in the office of the Sioux County
Herald at Harrison, Neb., on the 20th
day of September, 1889, take the oppor-
tunity to extend its hearty congratulations
to Hon. W. H. McMan, recently
appointed register of the U. S. land of-
fice for this northwest (Chadron) land
district.

The hour and place of holding all pri-
maries will be specified in the call posted
in each precinct.

Antelope precinct, at the house of
Geo. W. Cobb, at 2 o'clock, p. m.
Bodare precinct, at the ranch of J. G.
Morris, at 7 p. m.
Bowen precinct, at the court room, at
7 p. m.
White River precinct, at school house
in school district No. 1, at 4 p. m.
Cottonwood precinct, at Unionville
school house, school district No. —, at
2 p. m.
Hat Creek precinct, at ranch of C. F.
Coffee, at 7 p. m.
Five Points precinct, at school house
in school district No. 5, at 2 p. m.
Warbonnet precinct, at ranch of A. E.
Andrews, at 7 p. m.
Running Water precinct, at ranch of
A. McGinley, at 7 p. m.

It is further ordered that the chair-
man of the county central committee
act as temporary chairman, and the sec-
retary of the county central committee
act as temporary secretary of said coun-
ty convention.

It was also ordered that no proxies be
admitted to the convention except such
as are held by persons residing in the
precincts from which proxies are given.
