WASHINGTON, Nov. 28, 1889. In the speakership fight, sectionalism has overcome every regard for the personal qualifications in selecting a parliamentary leader by looking into his head rather than his post office address, has been thrown to the wind. If this course is allowed to govern the caucus it is as likely as not that the next speaker of the House will be as weak a presiding officer as was the monumental Keifer of Ohio. It is easily understood that the speakership of the Fifty-first Congress will prove no sinecure.
