Board of commissioners met in regular

session.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The county clerk made a statement to the

board in regard to the provisions sent to the

county for the poor and asked that a com-

mittee be appointed to distribute the same.

After considering the matter was postponed

until Jan. 14, 1891.

## Petition of Robert Harrison and others for

the establishment of a road to commence at

the southeast corner of section 12, township 22,

range 24, in Cottonwood precinct, road district No.

4, and running thence three miles and three-

fourths of a mile west, thence southwest to

a pine tree; thence south on ridge about 15

rods; thence on west side of ridge to top of

hill; thence south and west of breaks of Os-

age and Spring canyons to the center of sec-

tion twenty; thence south and west near

the line of old timber road, and on the most

practical route, and terminating at the

southwest corner of section thirty-five, township

23, range 24, and all other papers relating to

said road were taken up, and after due con-

sideration, the request was granted and the

line as surveyed by the surveyor and re-

ported by the commissioner, declared a pub-

lic road.

The proposition of L. J. Simmons and

Davis & Slingerland to publish the commis-

sioners' proceedings were considered, and

both being the same rate (one-third legal)

declared the official paper of Sioux county

for the year 1891.

On motion D. H. Griswold, Thomas Reidy

and Conrad Lindeman be and are hereby ap-

pointed a committee to attend to the distri-

bution of supplies for the poor donated to

Sioux county, and that the county clerk be

and is hereby instructed to appoint one ju-

stice of the peace in each precinct, and in

precincts in which there are no justices, one

responsible citizen to whom shall be present-

ed applications for aid, and upon the certi-

cate of whom aid shall be issued for seeds

or provisions that may be donated to Sioux

county during the year 1891, and the provi-

sions at present donated to be distributed by

the committee without certificates from ju-

stices of the peace.

Affidavit and request of B. F. Johnson in

regard to refunding taxes was taken up and,

on motion, the request was refused on the

ground that affiant did not pay taxes under

protest as required by law.

Affidavit and request of Bartlett Richards

in regard to refunding taxes was taken up

and, on motion, rejected on the ground that

the property taxed was not taxed twice or

double, but taxed separately, part of same

being listed as real estate and part as im-

provements on same.

The statement of M. Gayhart, county

treasurer, was examined and, on motion, ap-

proved.

The board proceeded to get the informa-

tion necessary in order to select the names

of persons from which to draw a petit jury

to serve at the February term of the district

court. The names of all persons who were

drawn as jurors for the past two years were

first obtained. The abstract of votes cast at

the last general election was examined and

the total number of votes polled was found

to be 458. It was found that there was no

election held in Sheep Creek precinct and

the assessor's book of said precinct was ex-

amined and found to contain ten names of
