Frozen 6,000 Feet Deep.

For many years scientists have been erplexed over the phenomeha of a cerain well at Yakutsk, Siberia. As long ago as 1828 a Russian merchant began to sink this noted well, and, after working on it for three years, gave it up as a bad job, having at that time sunk it to the depth of thirty feet without getting through the frozen ground. He communicated these facts to the Russian Academy of Science, which sent men to take charge of the digging op. perations at the wonderful well. These scientific gentlemen toiled away at their work for several years, but abandoned it when a depth of 882 feet had been resched, with the earth still frozen as hard as a rock. In 1843 the academy had the temperature of the soil at the sides of the well taken at various depths. From the data thus obtained they came to the starting conclusion that the ground was frozen to a depths exceeding 6,000 feet. Although it is known to meteorologists that the lowest known temperature is in that region of Siberia, it is conceded that not even that rigorous climate could force frost to such a great depth below the surface. A recent microscopical study by Herr Schultz of the skin of toads and salamanders has yielded some interestsalamanders has yielded some interest-ing results. There are two kinds of MAURY for the Government seems glands, mucous and poison glands. The former are numerous over the whole body, while the latter are on the body and limbs, and there are groups in the ear region benind the eye, and in the salamander at the angle of the jaw. The poison glands are, of course, protective, and the corrosive juice is discharged differently in toads and salamanders on stimulating electrically. In the latter it is spurted out in a fine jetsometimes more than a foot in length; whereas in the toad after long action of the current, it exudes sparingly in drops. There is no reason for supposing that the mucous glands become poisonous.

Elictric Lights and Eyesight.

Dr. John A. Payne, oculist says: Most persons who use the incandescent electric light like a new lamp because the light is whiter and more bril liant than after the lamp has been in use for two or three weeks. This is wrong. It is the dazzling white light that harms the eye. An old lamp is the best, for it these the light has become changed to a pale yellow, which is the ideal color. Just as in noonday brightness human sight is not so clear and far-reaching as at the yellow sunset, so a new incandescent burner is not so good for the eye as an old one. An old burner so adjusted and shaded hat the light from it does not shine in the face, is the ideal artificial light. An irgand gas-burner comes next. The o street lamps. Some storekeepers still use them, but they are terribly aurtful to the eye. This is because the mensity of the light is constantly changing, and this jumping of the daze is much worse for the eye than he flicker of the gaslight. 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
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
