#### School Tuition.

Satisfaction Guar-About a year ago an order was made by the school board that all children who anteed in all inwere not residents of the district should he charged one dollar each month tuition. The rule has never been enforced PROMPT ATTENTION GIVEN TO and no public notice was given that it had been made. A number have arranged to send children to school and others intend to do likewise and now the board has sent out notice that the above rate will be charged. A good deal of feeling is being aroused in consequence. There are about 60 children of school age living in the district and these draw about \$1.75 each from the state apportionments. The parents of children in the district will pay this year about \$50,00 school tax while those who have no children will pay \$948.53 school tax. LO., Thus it will be seen that parents will pay but a little over one dollar for each child for the nine months school. The school hoard employed two teachers at \$50,000.00 a cost to the district of \$80 per month. \$6,000,00 after they had agreed with one teacher to do the work for \$50 per month. The records show that the higher department, under Miss Conner, has an enrollment of but ten and none but the ordinary primary branches are studied. The lower department, under Miss Parsons, has twenty-seven enrolled, so that altogether it would not make a large school, and that number includes some for whom tuition is asked. Were schools established in the country so that settlers Parties wishing to buy or sell should could send their chiklren it would be different, but if they do not send here they will not be able to send anywhere and to assess them a dollar a month each appears to be rather high. 


