It would be well for the road overseers and those interested to look up the advisability of filling in with earth. It is a well established rule of railroads and all companies who have much grading to do to make earth fills Ed O'Connor. wherever at all practicable. In a country like this the filling serves a double purpose. It makes a crossing as good or better than a bridge and it also makes a dam to hold the water and the washings from above and the result will be that in a few years a number of acres of land will be leveled up in good shape, whereas if a bridge had been put in it would never be good for cultivation on account of the steep banks.
