REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION.

The republican electors of the state of Nebraska are requested to send delegates from their several counties to meet in convention in the city of Kearney Wednesday April 27, 1892, at 11 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of electing four delegates at large to the republican national convention to be held in Minneapolis, June 7, 1892.

THE APPOINTMENT. The several counties are entitled to representation as follows, being based upon the vote cast for Hon. George H. Hastings for attorney general in 1890, giving one delegate at large to each county and one for each 150 votes and the major fraction thereof:

It is recommended that no proxies be admitted to the convention, and that the delegates present be authorized to cast the full vote of the delegation.

It is recommended that the republicans of every county in this state be requested to select their county central committee at the first county convention held in their respective counties. Republican Convention, Sixth Congressional District.

The republicans of the Sixth Congressional district of Nebraska are hereby notified that there will be a republican delegate convention held in the city of Kearney, on Tuesday, the 20th day of April, 1892, for the purpose of electing two delegates and two alternates to attend the Republican National convention at Minneapolis.

Also to designate the time and place for holding the congressional convention of this district for nominating a candidate for Congress, also to transact such other business as may regularly come before it.

The basis of representation is the same as that fixed by the state central committee for the state convention, but no county shall have less than two delegates as follows:

Republican County Conventions.

The republican electors of Sioux County are requested to send delegates from their several precincts to meet in convention at the Court House in Harrison, Nebraska, on Wednesday, April 27th, at 11 o'clock, a. m., for the purpose of electing two delegates to the state convention to be held at Kearney, Neb., April 27th, 1892.

THE APPOINTMENT. The several precincts are entitled to representation as follows, being based upon the vote cast for Attorney General George H. Ranch from 4 to 6 p. m. 2 delegates. Montrose—At Montrose school house from 4 to 6 p. m. 2 delegates. Running Water—At Agate Springs Ranch from 4 to 6 p. m. 2 delegates. Snake Creek—At the residence of John Curran from 4 to 6 p. m. 1 delegate. Sheep Creek—At the residence of V. Thomas from 4 to 6 p. m. 1 delegate. White River—At school house in district No. 1 from 4 to 6 p. m. 2 delegates. Warbonnet—At school house in district No. 13 from 4 to 6 p. m. 2 delegates.

The legislature of Iowa has decided to let the prohibitory law of that state stand. It was thought that a local option law would be passed to take the place of prohibition but it was defeated.

The jury in the case of Capt. Yocum, at Hastings, for shooting the trader of his daughter returned a verdict of manslaughter. It must be that the men who composed that jury have no daughters, sisters or wives, whose honor they believe in protecting.

The Standard oil trust has voted to dissolve as the organization is contrary to law. What its course will be in future is hard to tell, but if the oil regions of Wyoming are developed it will be safe to believe that the Standard company has passed out of existence, but if that is not done it will be pretty good evidence that the great monopoly is still in existence.

The controversy between the United States and England in regard to the seal fisheries is progressing. Some talk war and some talk no war. The position taken by President Harrison is firm and pointed and in his position he has the support of his entire cabinet. By judging the future by the past it is safe to predict that all the war that will occur will be a war of words.

The call for the republican county primaries and convention appears in this issue. It is the duty of every republican to attend the primaries and see that good, clean, honest men are elected as delegates to the county convention, men who will be controlled by no ring, clique or gang but who will perform the duties devolving upon them in a fair and intelligent manner. The power of the masses is in the primaries and they should be well attended.

Speaking of the re-opening of the Thayer-Boyd case the former is quoted as saying that it is not the office he is after for a decision could not be expected before the term now being served had expired, but a decision on the point of whether or not a person could be made a citizen of the United States without his knowledge or consent. The selection of an agent for the Pine Ridge Agency is gaining in prominence all the time. Letters have been received within the last week from both the United States senators from Nebraska stating that they are in favor of the appointment of James H. Cook to the position and have urged such appointment, but they also state that the appointment by right of location belongs to South Dakota. That fact is recognized by all and if the matter can be properly presented to the senators from South Dakota there is no doubt but what the request of the people of the two states interested added to that of the Indians would secure the appointment. It is a matter of importance to every resident and property owner in the country near the reservation and a strong effort should be made to gain the desired end.

An Assessment Reform.

The next session of the legislature should provide a new method of assessing property for purposes of taxation, and a term in the penitentiary for any assessor who wilfully assesses property for less than its true value, and a similar term for any man who intentionally gives in his property at a less figure than represents its true value. This under-assessment business is getting to be a burning disgrace to the state, and it leads to the grossest kind of inequality and fraud, and does not diminish to the extent of a dime the amount of money necessary to be raised by taxation. Property being assessed at from one-sixth to one-twentieth of real value makes us appear to great disadvantage to people in the east who see figures showing that we pay taxes aggregating from 5 to 7 per cent. on the value of the property taxed, a figure higher than the rate of interest in eastern states, and as high as eastern capitalists receive for western loans. It is no wonder that they hesitate to lend money here at 6 per cent when they observe from the figures that the tax on investments amounts to at least that figure. Matters have gone from bad to worse in that respect in this state, until a point has been reached where forbearance ceases to be a virtue. Whoever invented that shrinking, shirking system, is entitled to a monument of mud as a statesman without even honor or sense.

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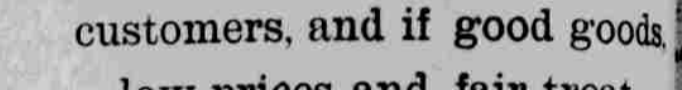
