**Loss by Fire.**

On last Thursday night the store building of County Treasurer Gayhart, at Montrose, with its contents was burned. The building was owned by Mr. Gayhart and contained his stock of general merchandise and the postoffice. The business was conducted by his daughters, he being engaged with his farm work at his place a couple of miles from the store. On the night in question a man came to the store quite late to make some purchases and while being waited on a lamp tipped over and set fire to a lot of papers. An effort was made to extinguish the flame and would likely have succeeded had not a draft been admitted which fanned the flames so that they soon got beyond control. But little was saved except the books, and the amount of the loss has not been ascertained. The post-office supplies were burned and the mail came up on Saturday in the pocket of the mail carrier. The loss falls entirely on Mr. Gayhart for there was no insurance on either building or contents. We are not informed whether Mr. Gayhart intends re-building or not.
