There is no school this week on account of a case of scarlet fever in the family of one of the patrons of the school. In all towns of any considerable size, strict quarantine ordinances are established and when a case of contagious or infectious disease occurs the house is quarantined and its occupants compelled to keep to themselves in order that a spread of the disease may be prevented. Here no such laws have been made and it would be well for the school board to make a rule that in case of a child having a disease which is contagious or infectious no member of the family shall be admitted to the school until given a certificate by a physician that there is absolutely no danger of the disease being transmitted to others. No one wants to be the cause of the sickness or death of the children of their neighbors. Sometimes people get a wrong idea which leads them to do things which they should not do. It would be wise for the school board to see that the rooms and surroundings at the school house are frequently and thoroughly disinfected. If proper precautions are taken further trouble may be prevented.
