How Irrigation Pays.

The ditch is about twelve miles long and will irrigate about 10,000 acres of land. It will be ready for operation, and there is no doubt as to its success. The ditch cost less than \$3,000. The townships through which the ditch or canal passes assisted in its construction by voting bonds, but the canal is owned by a stock company. Since the success of the undertaking was assured, land under the ditch has increased from 50 to 100 per cent, and it is estimated that the total appreciation in value of the unimproved land is not less than \$100,000.
