A correspondent of the Hudson Reporter suggests that a factory be looked up which will make oil and paper from sunflowers. That is a staple crop and has been found to be profitable where the improved varieties have been introduced.

The best test of the plan of irrigation by windmill on the high table land where the water has to be raised a long distance is reported by J. H. Bartell. He lifts the water about two hundred feet with a ten foot mill, attached to a pump of one and a quarter inch pipe with a two and a half inch cylinder. He has a forty barrel tank for reservoir. With this plant he irrigated about a quarter of an acre last year and with so good results that he is highly pleased. He will arrange to use the water with less waste in future and will increase the area watered to quite an extent. The amount of truck which can be produced on a quarter of an acre of land by the proper use of water will surprise any one who has not investigated it.
