The sugar factory at Grand Island had to decline offers of contracts for beets, having an acreage sufficient contracted to run the factory to its full capacity during the season. That means good times for Grand Island and the beet growing country around it.

From the remarks of the press of northwest Nebraska it is quite certain that if the newspaper fraternity had the say in the deputy oil inspectorship Editor Sheldon would have the place by a unanimous vote. The newspaper boys believe in the recognition of services rendered, although it is seldom done.

Some of the people of Chadron still have faith that the factories will yet be built at that place. "Faith without works (factories) is dead" outside of Chadron, and some work will have to be done before the people in general will have any faith in the scheme after what has been done, or better, what has not been done.

The article which appears in another column from the Chadron Journal in regard to the use of seines in trout streams should be heeded by every one who is interested in getting the streams stocked with good fish. A good dose of prosecution would teach the unprincipled scamps who use seines to respect the law and the rights of the general public, and give the trout a little show. White river is being "fished to death" and there will not be a trout, big or little, left in it by the end of the season if the seining is not stopped.

The Chadron Signal seems to think it strange that THE JOURNAL should say that the bill over which Stewart got his whiskers pulled was a bad one because it was supported by republicans. There are several laws which are not good which have been enacted by republicans. Parties are made up of human beings and none of them can be perfect, even if the pops do claim to be better than any other. Because a bill comes from a republican source is no more reason that it is without fault than is one originated by a pop sure to be bad.

A good deal has been said in the case against ex-Treasurer Hill about the small amount each taxpayer of the state would lose if the case is dropped and the number of men on the bond of the defendant who will be ruined if the case goes against them. That is all foolishness. If the bondsmen did not expect to keep their agreement they should have kept off the bond. If that kind of sympathy racket is worked in the case in question it can be worked in every case where a public official is not able to dig up the funds which come into his hands. No one wants to see the bondsmen ruined but they do want to see the rights of the public protected.

The vials of wrath have been opened on Governor Holcomb because of his appointments in some cases. J. V. Wolfe, one of the leaders of the pop party has gone after him and the pops in the northwest part of the state are up in arms on account of the appointment of Jim Dahlman as deputy inspector. The Sheridan county pops say the place was promised to Judge Hullock of Rushville, and the reformers of James county are not because Editor Sheldon was played false with. Sheldon says that the governor evidently considers the pops of this part of the state solid and wants to try and get what is left of the democratic party. One thing is quite certain and that is that the wheel-horses of the party to which Governor Holcomb pretends to belong do not consider that he has treated them fairly and he may see the time when he will regret that he played fast and loose with those to whom he is indebted for the high position which he occupies. An office-seeker cannot afford to ignore or play false to the workers of his party. The squabble over appointments among the pops is conclusive proof that the leaders of that party are reformers for office or revenue only.

Just Our Sentiments.

It is authentically reported from Andrews that large numbers of trout have recently been taken out of the stream there by the use of seines, and that fishing has been forbidden by the owners of land through which a portion of the stream runs. Some parties from Whitney were there recently with seines and took out about 200 trout. This is a matter which should be looked into by every true sportsman in northwest Nebraska. If the stream at Andrews is to be abused as the Long Pine stream has been, it will be depleted and another fine fishing ground will have been ruined by law-breakers. There is a very stringent law regarding the use of seines, and if those

who use them can be apprehended they can be made to furnish an example which will undoubtedly discourage any further use of seines. There is only one way to find out the guilty parties, and that is for every sportsman to keep his eyes and ears open and when reports of seining come, use every effort to discover who the parties were. There are game clubs enough in this vicinity to carry on a hot legal prosecution and there are enough true sportsmen among the legal fraternity who will undoubtedly be as glad to donate their services in this cause as is the press. Make it a point to find out who uses seines; chase down reports of seining; be always on the alert and good results will follow. This wholesale capture of trout by the use of seines in the only really fine trout stream near here must be stopped, and we are of the opinion that there are enough sportsmen in this vicinity who would be willing to contribute something to hire a man to guard the stream and arrest violators of the game laws. A few hot prosecutions will put a damper on this nefarious business and will preserve the stream to the proper use of the rod and line. Wake up, sportsmen, and do not permit mercenary law-breakers to despoil you of your best fishing ground.

New School Laws.

The late legislature enacted several new laws affecting school interests, the most important of which I desire to call to the attention of school officers and others interested.

1. All orders hereafter issued shall draw interest at the rate of seven per cent per annum.
2. All school orders shall be paid in the order of their presentation therefor, and the treasurer of every school district shall keep a warrant register, which register shall show in columns arranged for that purpose, the number, date and amount of each warrant presented and registered as hereinafter provided, the particular fund upon which the same is drawn, the date of presentation, the name and address of the person in whose name the same is registered, the date of payment, the amount of interest and the total amount paid thereon, with the date when notice to the person in whose name such warrant is registered is mailed as hereinafter provided.

3. All public high schools in this state which shall be determined by the state department of education to be properly equipped as to teachers, appliances and course of study shall hereafter be open to attendance by any person of school age residing outside the district, who is a resident of the state, and whose education cannot profitably be carried further in the public school of the district of his residence; Provided, that such pupil must have a certificate, signed by the county superintendent, that said pupil has completed the common school course prescribed by the state department of education for work below the high school. There are other provisions in the law, but the foregoing is sufficient to give its effect.

4. When children of school age live with their parents or guardians more than one and one-half miles from the school house in their own district, and at least one-half mile nearer to the school house in an adjoining district, distances to be measured by the shortest route possible upon section lines or traveled road open to the public, such children may have school privileges in the said adjoining district instead of in the district of their residence under the following conditions, to-wit: The parent or guardian of such children shall, at or before each annual meeting, notify the county superintendent of each district affected, using such form of notice as the state superintendent shall prescribe, which notice shall state the distances, as herein provided and shall be attested by the signature of a legal voter and taxpayer of each district in addition to the signature of said parent or guardian, who shall notify the director of the district to transfer such person, together with such children or wards to said adjoining district for school purposes for the school year next ensuing, and it shall be the duty of the said directors and boards of education in cities to enumerate said children or wards in the adjoining district and not in the district of their residence.
