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Sioux county is the northwest county of Nebraska. It is about thirty miles east and west by about seventy miles north and south and contains

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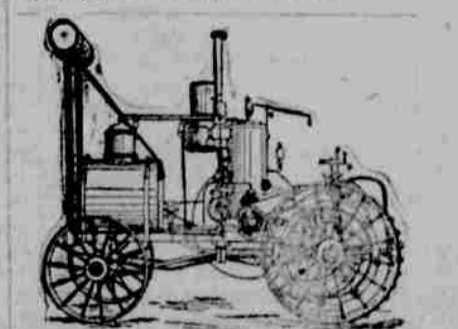
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
