The people's independent electors of Sioux county are requested to send delegates to the county convention to meet at Harrison, Neb., on Saturday, August 17, 1895, at 1 o'clock, p. m., to elect delegates to the state and judicial conventions and to place in nomination candidates for the various county offices. Representation will be as follows, being based on the vote cast for Hon. Silas A. Holcomb for governor in 1894:

Andrews precinct, 2 delegates; Antelope, 2; Bolare, 2; Bowen, 3; Cottonwood, 5; Five Points, 2; Hat Creek, 2; Highland, 1; Montrose, 4; Running Water, 1; Snake Creek, 2; Sugar Loaf, 3; Warbonnet, 3; White River, 3; Whistle Creek, 2, making a total of 35.

It is recommended that primaries be held at the usual place and hours in the various precincts on Thursday, August 15, 1895, for the election of delegates and nomination of candidates for precinct offices.

COMMISSIONER'S RECORD.

HARRISON, NEB., July 31, 1895.

Board of county commissioners met as per call of clerk.

Present—Commissioners Tinkham and Weber and clerk.

The report of Commissioners Tinkham and Weber being in favor of the approval of the three bridges recently constructed across White river, the report was, on motion adopted and the bridges approved.

The petition of Henry Priesheit and others asking for the removal of county bridge across Hat creek and the removal of the same was taken up and on motion said petition was rejected.

The petition of Robert Harrison and others asking that sections 24, 25, 26 and 27, township 33, range 54, of Five Points precinct, and township 34 and fractional 35, range 33 to South Dakota line and sections 36, 37, 38, 39, 40 and 41 of township 33, range 34, of Montrose precinct be annexed to Sugar Loaf precinct, was taken up and after due consideration had over until next meeting.

On motion the clerk is hereby authorized to advertise for and receive bids for the replating of county bridge across Hat creek on section line between sections 24 and 25, township 33, range 54, according to plans and specifications to be found at the clerk's office, reserving the right to the board to reject any or all bids. All bids to be accompanied by bond in double the amount of the bid and to be filed with the clerk before 12 o'clock, noon, of the first day of September, 1895.

On motion the county treasurer is hereby instructed to transfer the sum of \$100 from the bridge fund of 1894 to the bridge fund of 1895.
