## Wind Wheels.

A few fragmentary reports of occasional work done by wind wheels were received, some of which I will mention -Most of the people have got through merely to show what they accomplish. In Texas a wheel 12 feet in diameter raised from 50,000 to 100,000 gallons per month to a height of 50 feet. In Wisconsin a wheel 10 feet in diameter raised 50 barrels of water per day to a deight of 50 feet. In Iowa a 10-foot wheel raised water 40 feet in sufficient quantity for 300 cattle. A 16-foot wheel in Missouri has ground 20 bushels of corn in one hour. A 10-foat wheel in Nebraska raises 1,000 gailons per day to a height of 70 feet.

A case deserving of more notice is one reported by P. H. James, of Cortland, Neb. He used a wheel 10 feet in diamfeet through a 2-inch pipe. 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
