At the meeting of the board of commissioners last week some petitions for changes in precincts and the erection of new ones came up for consideration. They could not be acted upon for the reason that it was so near the general election and the changes asked for would have changed the lines of the commissioner districts, and the law would not allow that at this time of the year. It is quite likely that a number of changes will be made early in the year so that if any other localities want anything in that line they should get their petitions in. The consolidation of Sheep Creek and Running Water precincts will make quite a saving to the county and will cause no inconvenience to the people.

The Mass Convention.

The mass convention last week was quite well attended and was a very good-natured affair. The results in some instances were quite unexpected. It looked as if M. Gayhart would be the nominee for treasurer but when the time came his name was not mentioned.

Sheriff Dew did not desire a nomination for the office he now holds but he would have been pleased to have been chosen as the nominee for treasurer, but he did not have the needed strength.

Treasure Woodruff decided a few days before to make an effort for renomination but not soon enough to secure help enough. Charles Bielie, the nominee, has been a resident of this county for many years and is well known and his selection is conceded to be a strong one.

There is no doubt that the main thing which prevented the naming of Mr. Woodruff for a second term was the controversy which occurred nearly two years ago in regard to his having Sheriff Dew perform clerical work in the treasurer's office, and what applied to him applied also to Mr. Dew to a great extent.

It is admitted by all that M. J. Blewett has made a good county clerk, and no kick has been made by any one who has had business with him and he was selected as the candidate for a second term by acclamation without an opposing vote.

For sheriff a friendly contest was made by N. D. Hamlin and R. L. Keel which resulted in the former developing the most strength and he was made the nominee.

For superintendent it was recognized that no one would stand any show in a race against W. H. Davis so he was declared the choice of the convention.

The office of county judge does not pay enough so that any one can afford to move to the county seat if elected and as Judge Wilson lives so near town that he can attend to it, the convention made him its nominee.

For surveyor S. L. Ellis was unanimously chosen to be his own successor. Being an engineer his work during the past two years has given satisfaction to the people and he has a wide acquaintance all over the county.

Dr. Phinney being the only physician in the county was very properly named as the candidate for coroner, and he will without doubt be elected.

Taken as a whole the result of the convention shows that the men who gathered there acted on purely non-partisan lines and used their best efforts to prepare to make a fight. It was controlled entirely by the outside precincts, very few business men or residents of this precinct having participated. No one was turned down for spite and no man's personal ambitions were allowed to dictate the action taken. The men named are all good men, who are pretty generally known throughout the county. It is more than likely that the action of the convention will make some difference in the program of the independent convention which will meet on Saturday.

COMMISSIONERS' RECORD.

HARRISON, NEB., Oct. 1, 1895.

Board of county commissioners met in regular session.

Present: Commissioners Johnson, Tinkham and Weber, and clerk.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

On motion the county treasurer be and he hereby is ordered and authorized to refund to C. S. Brown \$5.00; to A. S. Leonard \$3.33, and to C. P. Douglass \$2.68. Also to remit to A. S. Leonard \$2.18 and to Wm. Leonard \$0.60 cents, the same being school taxes erroneously levied in school district No. 25.

On motion the order heretofore made annexing the territory included in Sheep Creek precinct to Whistle Creek precinct be and the same is hereby re-scinded.

The petition of Robert Harrison and others praying for the annexation of certain territory to Sugar Loaf precinct was presented, and on motion, laid over until the next regular meeting.

The petition of Henry R. Reed and others praying for the erection of a new precinct was presented, and on motion, for the reason that it makes a change in the 3d commissioner district.

The resignation of Charles J. Paddy as justice of the peace for White River precinct was presented and on motion accepted.

The board then proceeded to obtain the information necessary in order to select the names of sixty persons from which to draw a petit jury to serve at the November, 1895, term of the district court.

The names of all persons who have been drawn as jurors within the past two were first obtained. The abstract of votes cast at the last general election was examined and the total number of votes polled in the county was found to be 410, but Sheep Creek and Running Water precincts were found not to have held an election in 1894. The assessors books for Sheep Creek and Running Water precincts for the year 1894 were consulted to find the number of persons eligible to serve from said precincts. Nine such persons were found to reside in Running Water precinct and ten such persons were found to reside in Sheep Creek precinct, which added to the 410 makes 429, which number divided by 60, the number of persons to be listed for jury purposes, it was found that one person could be listed for each seventy and three-twentithree electors found in each precinct.
