Some one has started the report that Tom Majors will again be a candidate for governor. Mr. Majors would do a favor to himself and to the republican party of the state by promptly denying the report.

Judge Bartow has granted a new trial to Arthur Morrison on the charge of murder for the killing of Von Harris. The verdict was thought by many to have been excessive, but there were other reasons for the action of the court.

F. W. Smith, of Alliance, has been mentioned as a candidate for delegate to the national convention at St. Louis.

As member of the executive committee of the state central committee in the last campaign Mr. Smith did excellent work for the republican party and demonstrated that he has executive and organizing ability and if he has a desire to help name the next president who shall say him may.

The president has not yet named the Venezuelan commission, nor has he given any intimation as to who will compose it. The indications are that the matter will be adjusted without war. England has so many interests in all parts of the world that she cannot afford to go to war with any other nation for while her attention was directed to her outside some of her colonies would embrace the opportunity to renounce their allegiance to Great Britain.

Judge Scott, of Omaha, a few days ago sentenced Editor Raker of Greeley, to one year in the penitentiary for libel, in passing the sentence the judge took occasion to roast the press in general in terms not at all creditable to a person in his position. Appeal was at once made to the supreme court and a stay of sentence obtained. It is claimed that Raker did not have a chance to prove the truth of what he had published, and if that is true the supreme court will be apt to free him.

A. E. Cady, of St. Paul is mentioned as one of the several candidates for the congressional nomination by the republicans of the Big Sixth. Mr. Cady is one of the foremost statesmen in the state and is fully equipped for any office within the gift of the people. The editor of this paper is a strong admirer of Mr. Cady, and yet he can see one thing that might turn many republican votes against him, were he given the nomination, and that is the fact that he is the president of a national bank. With us that counts for nothing, but the masses might look at that the same as we do.—Alliance Gold.

The bond of John W. Tinkham for the construction and completion of county bridge on section 24, township 23, range 4, on county road No. 62, was presented and on motion, approved.

On motion Grant Guthrie was appointed county attorney to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Alvin T. Clark.

Commissioner Tinkham reported in favor of allowing county bridge to be built on county road No. 22, as prayed for in petition on file, and on motion the prayer of the petitioners was granted, and all parties desiring to bid for the erection and completion of said bridge are hereby requested to file the same with me in the sum of \$1,000 with the county sheriff, by 12 o'clock noon, of January 14, 1896. Said bridge to be at least 40 feet long and at least ten inches in diameter at small end, said bridge to be planked and braced with two-inch planks, well spiced with sixty piano spikes, and all the materials, number, species, sizes and skill and labor used in constructing said bridge shall be furnished at the expense of the party getting the contract.
