

A correspondent to the Nebraska Farm r has the following to say: "Red Willow county is justly and rightly called the 'great alfalfa region.' Last year was one of extreme and continuous drouth and yet a great many fields of alfalfa were cut four times and the entire yield was seven to ten tons of excellent hay to the acre and this without any irrigation whatever. Hay is worth \$4 to \$5 per ton. Some fields were cut twice for hay and once for seed. Seed was light last year, the yeild being only four to six bushels per acre. Nice clean seed is worth \$6 per bushel. Take bay, seed and pasturage and it is reasonably safe to reckon a season's growth of alfalfa at \$25 to \$40 an acre per year. Eight acres of stationery consisting of kept twenty head of cattle and horses from April 1st to June 1st when they were turned off. July 12th a crop of hay was cut and the last of September a seed crop, and then pastured through I will put you is a machine which will October and November. One acre of alcrops of hay last year.
