No Evidence on Which to Prosecute.

Yesterday Coroner Phinney, Sheriff Bartlett and County Attorney Guthrie went out to Warblomet precinct to investigate the Norsisch affair. They interviewed all who had been reported to have knowledge of the facts, but none would admit having seen the child or any proof that one had been delivered as reported. The members of the family all denied that part of the story, but it was admitted that Norsisch had a row with his wife on the day in question.

It was found that a number of men had called at the house on Monday night and took Norsisch out and gave him a severe whipping from the effects of which he is still in bed and will likely stay there for a week or so longer. It is not known who participated in that part of the program. THE JOURNAL does not advocate that method but it may put a stop to the abuse of his family, for if he can continue to rule his family as reported says he has and evidence cannot be obtained on which to prosecute, he may go from bad to worse until the end will be the worst in the criminal calendar.

The officials have done their duty in the matter and if any one wants the case carried any further it will be necessary for them to make complaint. It matters not who it is in a civilized community he must recognize that he has no right to abuse his family, even if he is so lost to humanity that he would mistreat those who are dependent upon him and whom he is in duty and honor bound to protect and cherish.
