James Loneragan, section foreman of the section just across the line in Wyoming, came down here last week with a bad case of erysipelas in his face, the result of his having taken cold. He was in bad shape for a few days, but has improved so that he is able to be out, but it will be some time before he will be able to resume work.

It would be a good plan if people would make a practice of burning waste paper instead of throwing it out to blow about the streets. During the high winds of late several tenements have been frightened by blowing papers and serious injury may result.

George Olinger started yesterday for the south with his band of horses. He will go to southern Missouri and perhaps into Arkansas to dispose of them, and seek a location. He expects to return in a couple of months for his family. Floyd Clark accompanied him on the trip.

The people of Sioux county, and especially of White River precinct, have had all the experience they have any use for with a place of that kind and it will not be tolerated. Because the authorities allowed it to exist some years ago should not be taken as a warrant that the present officials will do likewise. Such a place should not be permitted to exist in a civilized community and the people would commend the crushing of it by the authorities at whatever cost.

As soon as C. B. Hollingsworth returns from the south he expects to move on the head of Indian creek, in Wyoming where his cattle are now. Cattle are getting so numerous in the valley that the question of feed is becoming an important one.

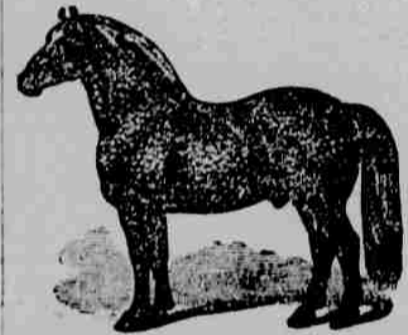

HORSE BREEDERS.

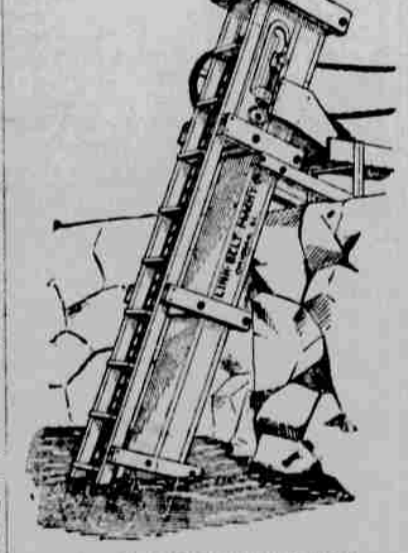
The fine 4-year-old Shire Stallion will make the stand for the season of 1896 at \$5.00 to insure a mare in foal.
