—On last Saturday Henry Lindeman brought his wool to town to ship when it was attached by Hester & Son in order to collect pay for a gang plow. Lindeman claimed he did not owe the debt and gave a release bond and shipped the wool. The hearing is set for the 28th, Clark for plaintiff and Guthrie for defendant.

—The latest report is that the artesian well at Marsland is down over 500 feet and still going down. The people of that place do not propose to stop short of 1,000 feet if artesian water is not obtained before reaching that depth. The experiment is being watched with much interest by all northwest Nebraska.

—I. R. McIntire, the photographer, is getting so much work that he will remain for a week or ten days yet and all those desiring photographs should call as soon as convenient and have negatives made. He has work finished so that people may see the class of photos he makes, and his prices are reasonable. —The commissioners will meet on Tuesday, June 15th as a board of equalization. —The annual school meetings of all of the school districts of the state will occur on Monday, June 29th. These meetings are of great importance to the residents and taxpayers of their respective districts, for at that time the amount of school tax to be levied is decided upon and the school work for the ensuing year is mapped out.
