When THE JOURNAL mentioned the fact last week that John Hanson went down the road the writer was not aware of the important mission on which he was bent. He went to the county judge at Chadron and procured a license to wed Miss Ida Sides. Presiding Elder Julian was called upon and united the young couple in the bonds of marriage and they were here to celebrate the 4th and receive the congratulations of many friends and good wishes of all for a long, happy and prosperous married life.

The populists held their county convention yesterday. It was not largely attended, no controversy occurred over anything. Judge Wilson and D. A. Publow were elected delegates to the state convention, and W. J. A. Raum and James Nolan to the congressional, senatorial and representative conventions. Grant Guthrie was nominated for county attorney, and B. F. Thomas for surveyor to fill vacancy. W. J. A. Raum was elected chairman of the county central committee and F. W. Knott secretary.

The adjourned school meeting on Monday was not largely attended and most of those present were residents of the village. The object of every one present seemed to be to devise ways and means to provide the necessary accommodations for the children with the least expense and still have something permanent. After considerable informal discussion the board was authorized to have an addition built on the east of the present building, changing the entrance from the west to the south side, at an expense not to exceed \$600.00, and a levy of 11 mills for general fund was voted to meet the expense. Until the old indebtedness of the village is wiped out the taxpayers are not likely to favor anything which is not absolutely necessary which will increase the rate of taxation.

American Poisons.

The Frenchman, not without reason, calls our food drinks "American Poisons." As a matter of fact, cool spring water will allay thirst much better than iced water; but it is very difficult to convince those addicted to the iced-water habit of this fact. The grave harm caused by iced water is from swallowing it quickly and in large quantities. If sipped slowly and held in the mouth for a moment, the temperature is raised appreciably before it reaches the stomach, and its cooling effects reach that part of the body where it is most needed,—the head, throat, and upper part of the chest. For this reason iced cream is much less dangerous than iced water; we eat it slowly, and it is not only entirely melted, but also perceptibly warmed, before it enters the stomach.

This well known fact, which every one can verify for himself, is entirely ignored by those alarmists who draw so harrowing pictures of the internal economy, representing the stomach and its contents as almost paralyzed by the sudden congealing influence of the introduction of a mass of frozen cream. Of course if this were so the danger would be immense, for when the stomach is attending to its appointed duties—actively engaged in the process of digestion—it is a little furnace, and any tampering with its fires results in the immediate discomfort of its owner and overseer. When you deluge it with iced drinks you put out the fires, and arrested digestion means acute pain and much discomfort. Don't ask it to do so much work when the thermometer goes above 80 degrees; then the fires will not have to be so hot, and you will not suffer from what you feel is a consuming thirst.—From "Sanitary Hygiene", in Demorest's Magazine for July.

Ordinance No. 37.
An Ordinance for the levy of taxes for the Village of Harrison, Nebraska, for the municipal fiscal year of 1896.

Be it ordained by the chairman and board of trustees of the village of Harrison, Nebraska:

SECTION 1.—That there is hereby levied upon all the taxable property within the corporate limits of the village of Harrison a tax as follows:

For general fund..... 10 mills
For sinking fund and interest..... 7 mills
For water fund..... 4 mills
For special debt fund to apply on judgment..... 13 mills

SECTION 2.—This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.

An annual appropriation Ordinance for the municipal fiscal year of 1896.

SECTION 1.—That the following amounts be and the same are hereby appropriated for the purposes specified, to-wit:

For pumping water.....\$250 00
Interest and sinking fund..... 170 00
Special debt fund..... 600 00
All other expenses..... 150 00
