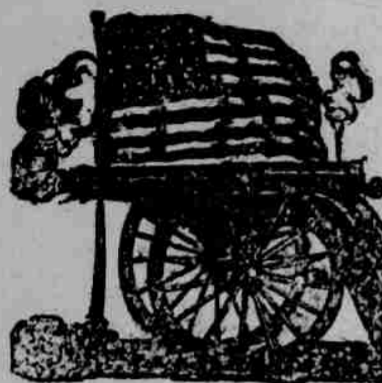

In our own opinion, we consider the new head to be an ideal name. We trust this will meet with the approval of all our readers.

The only people that are making any outcry against the nomination and election of Hon. W. J. Bryan in 1900, is the Republican party and a few gold democrats, who in '96 were ashamed to come out openly and vote their honest sentiments—a republican ticket—but put up a straw ticket thinking by so doing they could split the democratic party, and thus insure the election of president McKinley. Of course they fooled the people somewhat, but worst of all the coercion and system of espionage upon the laboring vote, who were openly, given to understand that if they did not vote for Mr. McKinley and the gold standard, high protection, trust party, they would be thrown out of a job &c. &c. ### Champ Clark Sees Success.

Jackson, Miss., July 30.—"Nothing short of death can prevent Bryan from being the democratic nominee and nothing out the Almighty will prevent him from securing it," said Congressman Champ Clark of Missouri in an interview today. "Democratic chances of success have improved fully 50 per cent in the last four months and are now brighter than they have been in any presidential campaign in the last twenty years. It is practically settled what the party platform will be and it may be outlined as follows: Re-enactment of the Chicago platform, declaration against expansion, strong plank against trusts and other oppression, opposition to large standing army and advocacy of economy in public expenses."—World-Herald.

## County Convention.

A delegate convention of the People's Independent Party of Sioux County, Nebraska, is hereby called to meet at the Court House in Harrison, Nebraska, on Saturday, August 12, 1899 at one o'clock p. m., for the purpose of selecting delegates to the congressional, judicial, and state conventions, for placing in nomination candidates for the various county offices and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before the convention, the various precincts in the county will be entitled to representation in said convention based upon the vote for Hon. W. A. Foynter for governor in the general election of 1898. One Delegate being allowed for each ten votes and major fraction thereof and one at large from each precinct, which makes the following apportionment:

## GREENBACKS or Government Money.

At close of our Civil War in 1865, there appeared in the London Times the following:

"If that mischievous financial policy which had its origin in the North American Republic during the late Civil War in that country, should become indurated down to a fixture, then that government will furnish its money without cost. It will have all the money that is necessary to carry on its trade and commerce. It will become prosperous beyond precedent in the history of civilized nations of the world. The brain and wealth of all countries will go to North America. THAT GOVERNMENT MUST BE DESTROYED OR IT WILL DESTROY EVERY MONARCHY ON THIS GLOBE."

The famous Hazzard circular, to capitalists in New York, and the Buell Bank circular to United States Bankers, both emanating from London, and the fabulous corruption fund raised in England and Germany, estimated at \$1,500,000, were the agents that secured the closing of our mints against silver.

The "walk into my parlor" policy of England, during and since the Spanish War, is the latest evidence of English Diplomacy in shaping the destiny of the United States Government.

Notwithstanding the famine price of wheat, the Spanish War, and fabulous expenditures of money by our government during the past year, gold has increased in value eleven per cent, and all other values decreased in the same proportion.

Thayer the sum of \$5.27.

On motion the County Clerk is hereby ordered and instructed to issue warrant to E. K. Livermore chairman against the soldiers Relief fund for any and all money's now in said fund.

On motion the county Treasurer is hereby ordered and instructed to transfer all bonded school district sinking fund money accumulating after the bonded indebtedness has been fully satisfied to the general fund of said school districts.

On motion the county Superintendent is hereby allowed \$30.00 as full compensation for institute purposes for the year 1899.
